118th Annual Report, 1971 - 1972

To the Life Governors and Contributors

Ladies and Gentlemen,

On behalf of the Committee of Management, I have pleasure in presenting the 118th Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 30th June, 1972, for the Base Hospital, Alveston Old Folks Home and Corio Old Folks Home. These statements and reports set out the financial structure within which the Hospital and homes have operated during the year, list the charitable contributions received, and record other statistical information. They are an indication of the extent and cost of the health service which it is our responsibility to provide for the citizens of Warrnambool and district.

During the year under review our facilities for treating critically ill patients were further extended and improved with the opening of the new six-bed Intensive Care Ward in the month of August, 1971. This carefully planned, air conditioned unit, equipped with the most modern monitoring and resuscitative appliances, has been of great assistance during the acute period of serious illness, and the Medical and Nursing staffs have been able to practice their skills in a most advantageous environment.

Building Development:

Due to the construction of additional patient accommodation at Brierly Mental Hospital, Lyndoch and Timboon, it has been necessary to plan a large extension to the Central Linen Service building, to ensure that soiled linen is laundered to the high standard of cleanliness and sterility required for Hospital purposes. The extension consists of a completely new two-storey sorting and washing area. A mechanical conveyer will be installed to transport bags of soiled linen from the loading bay to the new sorting area, situated on a Mezzanine floor above the washing machines. When sorted the linen will be dropped through chutes direct into the washing machines below.

Fotheringham Constructions Pty. Ltd., of Warrnambool have contracted to build the extension at a cost of \$168,495. Among items of equipment included in the contract is a new Washer Extractor at \$26,400 and also a Connie Garment Press at \$5,200 for the drying and pressing of uniforms. The total finance for this project will be provided from Government Funds.

Another major and expensive undertaking has been the expansion of the X-Ray Department to provide three examination rooms and the installation of additional radiology equipment. Our own maintenance staff carried out the necessary building alterations to provide the additional room, and also attended to the extensive electrical rewiring required for the new plant, and extension of the air conditioning services to the new area. New equipment installed includes Image Intensifier with T.V. attachment, additional X-Ray table and Condenser Discharge Mobile X-Ray machine. The total cost of improvements in this area was \$45,500.

Plans and specifications have already been completed for further improvements to Marcus Saltau House which is one of the projects listed.

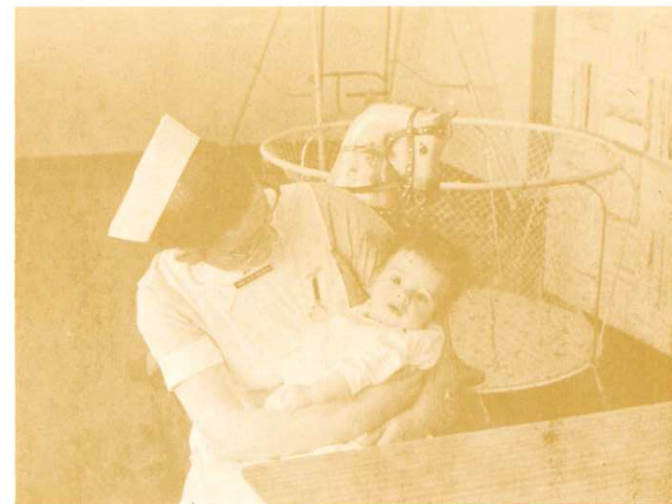
Hospitals & Charities Commission:

Our communications with the Chairman, Dr. Lindell and his fellow Commissioners have been received in the usual courteous and helpful manner. The Commissioners and their Executive Officers have given considerate and careful attention to our requirements and we tender our thanks for the co-operation and assistance which has been received.

Honorary Services:

A public Hospital places great reliance on the services rendered by its Honorary staff for the maintenance of a high standard of patient care.

During the past year the Medical profession in Warrnambool has experienced a severe shortage of practitioners which has imposed an extremely heavy load on those remaining. In spite of this situation our Honorary Medical Officers, Dentists and Optometrists have continued to give freely of their time and skills to the needs of our public patients, and are to be commended for their efforts in such adverse circumstances.

MEALS ON WHEELS SERVICE

Voluntary Services:

The Hospital is an area of intense activity in which many people practice their various professions and skills. Interwoven into the structure are our Meals on Wheels drivers, Ministers of Religion, Red Cross workers, Nestle Social Club and members of other organizations and Service Clubs who give their services on a voluntary basis. The efforts of all these good people contribute in no small measure to the further well being and comfort of patients under our care.

Finance:

The troublesome and vexed question of providing adequate funds for the conduct of health services, continues to be the subject of discussion and debate at political level. To further bolster income for hospitals a new scale of patients fees was introduced on 1st August, 1971 and contributions to Hospital Benefits Funds adjusted accordingly. It is now more essential than ever before that all persons maintain membership in a Benefit Organization to avoid the extreme financial burden which unexpected illness can inflict.

The Subsidized Health Benefits scheme assist families with low incomes and applications for assistance should be lodged by persons in this category.

Expenditure for the year has been contained within budget allocations and savings made wherever possible. One particular economy worthy of note was the introduction of a new S.E.C. tariff which had a marked effect on the electricity account by saving \$3,804.

Statistics:

In common with the past two years, beds available in the Medical and Surgical wards have again been utilized to capacity during this year. Statistics relative to daily average inpatients remain relatively stable, but there has been an increase in the number of inpatients treated. This indicates the pressure on our acute beds and results in an average shorter stay in Hospital by each patient.

Of particular note is the large increase of attendances at the Casualty and Out-patient department and Outpatient clinics. Since the opening of the new Casualty section in 1968, demand on the service has shown a progressive increase each year as indicated by the following figures:

Auxiliaries:

The Committee is justly proud of our ten loyal and active Auxiliaries, which have functioned over such a long period of time to provide funds for equipment and building development as the need arises, and our fine amenities are in no small measure due to the efforts of their members. The goodwill towards the Hospital, generated by these organisations throughout the various districts in which they operate, is an added bonus of great value. The total amount raised by Auxiliaries for the year was \$9,842.24.

Tours and Inspections:

It has been policy over many years to co-operate with and assist organisations who may wish to arrange organised tours of the various wards and departments. There has been continued interest in such tours and many groups including school children, Young Farmers clubs, church organisations, a Girl Guide company and a section of 29 domestic science teachers, have attended the Hospital for this purpose. We are indebted to Matron and her Nursing Supervisors who usually act as guides, and to the various departments for their co-operation. These visits create good public relations and are a valuable aid to staff recruitment.

Official visitors included the following:—

Bursaries Apprenticeships:

Regular attention must be paid to the continuity of staffing the various departments and the policy of granting bursaries and apprenticeships has been continued. At the present time financial assistance is being paid to undergraduates in the following professions:

Nursing staff members on Post Graduate courses are also receiving subsidies. We have two members of the kitchen staff serving their apprenticeships in the cooking trade and will recruit another at the beginning of 1973.

Staff Recruitment:

Every opportunity is taken to inform school students of careers available in the Hospital field. Staff members from all departments attended a "Careers Night" at St. Ann's College on 28/9/71, showed films and gave informal talks. This proved highly successful and many enquiries were received.

Life Governor certificates were also presented to Mr. A. Hooton on his retirement from the office of President after a two year term and to Mr. A. Cole on his resignation from the Committee.

Conferences:

Two important professional bodies conducted conferences at Warrnambool. Approximately 300 members and wives of the Australian Institute of Medical Laboratory Technicians gathered for two days during April and in the same month there was an attendance of some 40 members and wives of the Royal Victorian College of Pathologists. The Dietary staff provided excellent meals for the visitors which brought forward many favourable comments. We consider it an honour that Warrnambool is chosen as the venue for such occasions and every opportunity is taken to publicise district tourist attractions and our Hospital. These conferences also give professional members of the staff an opportunity to maintain contact with their colleagues.

Charitable Contributions:

The 3YB Radio Appeal was again conducted during June 1972 and the enthusiasm and efforts of the Management and staff at 3YB was maintained at the same level as previous years. This Appeal is the culmination of the total charitable effort for the year and is a valuable means of creating good public relations. A total amount of \$54,570 was raised for district Hospitals of which the Base Hospital received \$24,735, Alveston \$1,522 and Corio \$2,170.

The September Egg Appeal was conducted as usual, resulting in the collection of 1,013 dozen eggs, valued at \$700.

Regional Scheme:

The grouping of Hospitals into regions has been further extended to organizing the Regions into Sector Zones, to establish larger population groups, in an endeavour to make specialist medical services more readily available to country residents. Barwon (Geelong), Glenelg (Hamilton) and Corangamite (Warrnambool), comprise Sector Zone 5. Each sector in the State has been given projects on which to establish pilot schemes for study and trial.

As each project is satisfactorily completed, it will become the model for the remainder of the State to adopt in due course as finance and circumstances allow. Sector Zone No. 5 has been allocated Paediatrics and Medical Records as projects and progress is being made towards the provision of better child care throughout the Sector. Work is progressing with Medical Records towards a standardization of procedure to ensure that adequate records are maintained by every Hospital, to facilitate the preparation of accurate statistics. The ultimate aim is to accumulate information from all Victorian Hospitals on a Computer file for the production of accurate statistics relative to the incidence and pattern of disease throughout the whole state. Mr. Stewart Lindsay will continue as Sector Supervisor after his retirement as our Manager and Secretary.

PARA-MEDICAL SERVICES:

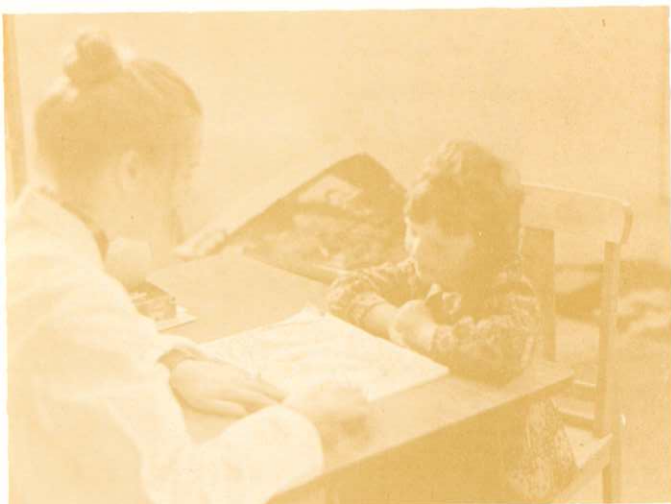
Radiology— As mentioned previously, considerable extension of area and re-equipping has taken place in this department to enable Dr. Rafferty and his staff to cope with increased demand for diagnostic X-Ray services. The following Statistics indicate the growth which has taken place during recent years and confirm the wisdom of extending the area and updating equipment.

Pathology:

The services of this department continue to be utilized to capacity and Dr. Reid and his staff are continually researching new items of sophisticated equipment which become available. They also keep themselves abreast with the latest techniques which evolve from the constant research which takes place in this field. In addition to the items of new and expensive equipment installed, considerable improvements were made to the Biochemistry laboratory by our Maintenance staff. SPEECH THERAPY

Pharmacy:

Our Pharmacist of many years standing, Mr. Cecil Waring continues to cope with the ever increasing requirements associated with the purchase and dispensing of drugs and mixtures. Staffing of the Pharmacy has remained stable for many years but the number of Pharmacy Units issued has increased during the past five years from 89,975 to 108,022. Total expenditure for drugs purchased was \$95109.

Social Welfare:

Miss D. A. Swinton retired from the position of Welfare Officer early in the new year and Mrs. I. McD. Taylor was appointed to the staff to carry out this most important function. Although the demands by Inpatients and Outpatients for welfare services continue to increase, Miss Swinton and Mrs. Taylor have efficiently administered the Meals on Wheels service throughout the year. An average of 43 meals were cooked in the Hospital kitchen and distributed by volunteer drivers each day. The Warrnambool City Council is currently discussing the appointment of a Municipal Social Worker and the Hospital Board has indicated its willingness to contribute a share of the cost.

Speech Therapy:

The demand for skilled attention to speech defects is rapidly increasing and the services of our therapists are constantly required. A visiting service to Yalundah Day Training Centre in Warrnambool and Coinda Retarded Childrens Centre at Terang was commenced earlier in the year, but the service has been considerably reduced since the resignation of Miss Margaret Stone. Efforts to recruit a replacement therapist to assist Mrs. J. Mackenzie have not been successful.

Physiotherapy:

We were fortunate to obtain the services of Miss Sandra Friend in the early months of 1972 to assist Mr. John Grace in this busy department for one year.

Two Physiotherapists trained under bursary will commence duty in 1973 and will give the department greater capacity to cater for patients needs.

Medical Records:

Miss Barbara Armstrong completed her tour of duty in early 1972 and was replaced by Miss Margaret Merricks. These two young librarians have been largely responsible for the success of our Inpatient reporting to the Computer Centre at Monash University. We have attained a good standard in the keeping of Medical records and Warrnambool Base is one of the few Hospitals which maintains indexes of diseases and operations for both Non-Public and Public patients.

Occupational Therapy:

Approaches have been made to the Hospitals and Charities Commission for the establishment of this service at Warrnambool. No further moves have

been made as the Commission has indicated that it considers that such a service would be better based at Lyndoch.

General Services:

To maintain a high standard of patient care the Medical and Nursing departments require strong support from the service departments. Mr. Bedgood (Engineer) and his tradesmen are untiring in their efforts to maintain buildings, plant and equipment in first class order. They are to be commended for their loyalty and devotion in supplying steam services and repairing plant following the unfortunate explosion in the Boiler House, during July of last year. Total cost of repairing damage was \$4,300 which was claimable under our Insurance policies.

Mr. Kelly (Catering Officer), conducts first rate food service for patients and staff, and is most co-operative in attending to catering arrangements for special functions. We particularly commend him and his staff for their efforts in connection with farewell functions associated with the retirement of Mr. Lindsay. The introduction of a centralized food service for patients in Marcus Saltau House is a further improvement in our Dietary Services instituted by Mr. Kelly.

Mrs. Horwood (Domestic Supervisor), has the responsibility of ensuring that housekeeping is of the highest standard. This is essential for the welfare of patients and the efforts of the staff in this area are greatly appreciated.

Mr. Earl (Central Linen Service Manager), and the laundry staff continue to provide a high grade of linen service to all Hospitals in the Corangamite Region and make their contribution towards the well being of our sick and aged patients.

Alveston and Corio Old Folks Homes:

The 80 beds at these two Homes continue to be in constant demand with many persons on the waiting list for admission. The Lyndoch construction is now progressing and according to reports the 50 bed infirmary will be completed towards the end of 1973. These additional beds will greatly assist in catering more adequately for the needs of our aged citizens.

In August 1971 the Matron at Alveston Mrs. V. Kent reached retiring age after 6 years of devoted service as Matron of the Home. The nursing of aged patients requires great tolerance and patience and Mrs. Kent at all times carried out her duties with careful regard to the high ethical code of her profession. The Deputy Matron Mrs. I. V. Bruce was appointed to succeed Mrs. Kent and continues to administer the Home in a professional and capable manner. Major improvements were the installation of a room cooling unit generously donated by the Lions Club and the covering of some floor areas with vinyl tiles at a cost of \$988.50

At Corio, our Matron Mrs. M. Hammond and her staff are untiring in their efforts to give comfort and attention to the 47 patients under their care. A major improvement carried out this year was the enclosing of the remainder

of the verandah to further extend the sunroom, and the construction of a ramp at the front entrance. Total cost of the project was \$2,365 and we are indebted to the Fletcher Jones organization for a donation of \$523 to assist with the payment of the committee's share. It was also necessary to provide finance for the following items:—

It was necessary to increase patients fees at both Alveston and Corio on 1/11/71 by \$2.10 per week.

Administration:

The Board of Management has been extremely fortunate in retaining the services of its Manager and Secretary, Mr. S.A. Lindsay for a period of 29½ years. With the aid and guidance of this extremely capable officer, it has been possible for the Board to pursue a planned programme of development with clearly defined objectives in view.

This has resulted in a Hospital complex, consisting of modern buildings, adequately staffed with skilled personnel, and equipped with the latest and most modern instruments and appliances for the diagnosis and treatment of sickness and disease. Having reached the age of retirement, Mr. Lindsay relinquished his position early in July 1972 and we tender him and Mrs. Lindsay our very best wishes for many happy and relaxed years. To recognize such valuable and outstanding service to the community, a civic dinner was conducted at the Warrnambool Town Hall, attended by approximately 250 persons representative of all individuals and groups associated with the Hospital and Health services in the City, Shire and Corangamite Region. Mr. R. Ham, Hospitals and Charities Commission; Mr. J. Walter, Australian Institute of Hospital Administrators; Mr. A. Russell and Mr. J. Keen, Hospital Architects; Mr. R. Beetham, former honorary Medical Officer; Mr. A. Anderson, former Board member and Mr. G. Rabach, Glenelg Base Hospital, travelled long distances to attend the function. Approximately 200 employees of the Base Hospital, Alveston and Corio assembled in the Cafeteria on the final day of Mr. Lindsay's service to officially farewell their loved and respected leader.

Many other farewell functions were organized by Auxiliaries, the Medical Group, Committee and annexe Hospitals to honour a successful and distinguished career in Hospital Administration.

The Assistant Manager, Mr. A. E. W. Matthews has been appointed to succeed Mr. Lindsay, Mr. S. G. Hando has been advanced from Accountant to Assistant Manager and Mr. W. P. Vaughan has joined the staff as Accountant.

These officers can be assured of the full support of the Board and we wish them successful and rewarding careers in Hospital Administration.

The Medical Superintendent, Dr. J. D. Reid continues to administer the medical services with skill and enthusiasm. The excellent relationship existing between the visiting staff and the Administration is to a large extent due to his professional ability and courteous manner. He is continually investigating the latest advances in techniques and equipment and is the driving force behind many of our projects. He will attend the World Congress of Anatomic and Clinical Pathology at Munich during September 1972 to gain further knowledge of latest developments in this field.

The Matron, Miss J. H. Stewart and her colleagues, Miss K. Taylor, Deputy Matron and Miss W. Hawker, Assistant Matron, control the all important Nursing Service in a professional and expert manner.

This department has an establishment of 229 persons, by far the largest unit in our work force. In addition to maintaining the ward service for 24 hours every day, Matron and her deputies are responsible for the conduct of the Nursing Training School and the Nursing Aide Training School. The highly satisfactory examination results are an indication of the efficient manner in which the training programmes are conducted. The Nurse Training School is among the few in Victoria which have attained 1,100 hours of classroom instruction for students during the three year course.

For many years our staff have conducted administrative duties for the Timboon and District Hospital and during the year we were requested to carry out similar functions for the Mortlake District Hospital. This added responsibility is progressing smoothly to the satisfaction of the Mortlake Committee.

Further progress was made towards adopting the programmes developed by the Hospitals and Charities Commission Computer Study Group at Monash University. All payroll functions for our 520 employees are now processed by computer and the production of Inpatient accounts commenced on 1st July, 1972.

The resignation of two members of the office staff, Miss Mary Lee and Miss Agnes Hogan, each with eight years service, imposed a heavy load on our Chief Clerk, Mrs. M. McDonough in the training of new members, and we record our appreciation for her loyal and energetic efforts in this regard.

Mr. Stephen Hando completed his five year course with the University of New South Wales and graduated as Bachelor of Health Administration. Our other two students, Paymaster, Mr. Cliff Jacobs and Administrative Assistant, Mr. Greg Gleason were successful in completing a further year of the course.

Conclusion:

In this report I have endeavoured to touch on all aspects associated with the conduct of Hospital services in Warrnambool for which the Board of Management is responsible. In such a complex involving so many people, it is impossible to mention all those who have assisted in some manner, to maintain a satisfactory standard of care for those citizens who have found it necessary to seek Hospital treatment. Sufficient to say that the Committee fully recognizes

the loyalty and co-operation of all staff members who carry out the daily routine duties, and value greatly the dedicated efforts of the many voluntary workers and honorary officers.

I wish to particularly mention our appreciation to his Worship the Mayor, Cr. H. I. Stephenson, and Shire President Mr. J. Gleeson for their continued interest in the affairs of the Hospital. Also the Warrnambool Standard, 3YB and B.T.V.6 for excellent news coverage to further promote public interest and goodwill.

My fellow members of the Committee and Chairmen of sub-committees have given splendid support and have debated the many matters which are brought before us with keen interest and enthusiasm.

Medical Superintendent's Report . . .

The hospital was busy during the year. Bed occupancy was high and all departments were working to capacity. The Honorary Medical Staff have been overworked as there is a shortage of doctors in Warrnambool. As a result the Outpatient Department was crowded at times but the Resident Medical Officers handled the situation satisfactorily so that the waiting time was not too long. The Intensive Care Ward justified its construction and was used for acute medical and post operative patients. Medical and Nursing care in this area is most demanding and is a strain on all concerned. A high standard was maintained under the supervision of Sister Quinlan and this was appreciated by patients and their relatives. In an acute hospital the long stay patient tends to be overlooked. The Nursing Staff in the geriatric wards must be commended for the efficient way in which they kept the patients mobile and active. Occupational therapy, though limited in scope, was effective. Specialised Geriatrics needs to be developed in the Region as the problem of the care of the elderly is becoming more difficult and needs a central controlling organisation.

Staff:

A special tribute must be made to Mr. S. Lindsay, the retiring Manager and Secretary. His foresight, organising ability, and capacity to get things done resulted in the construction and equipping of the Hospital which is probably one of the best in the State. I have always been impressed with his ability to grasp and solve problems no matter in which department they occurred. We wish him well in his semi-retirement.

Mr. D. Davidson became orthopaedic Surgical Registrar at Hobart.

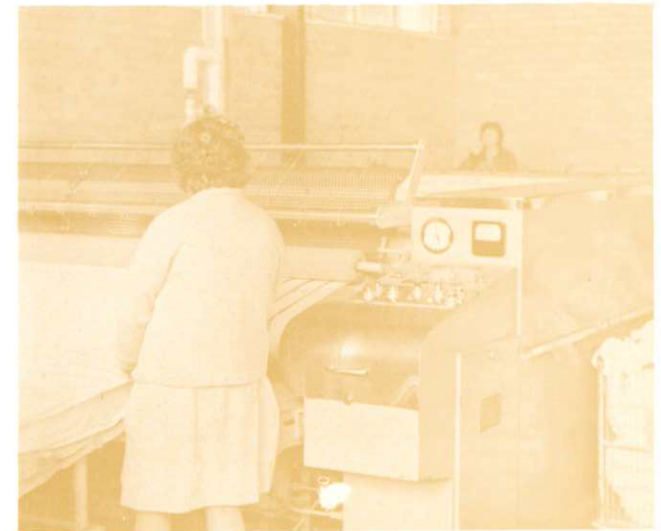
Resident Medical Officers:

4 ROLL IRONER AT WORK IN CENTRAL LINEN SERVICE



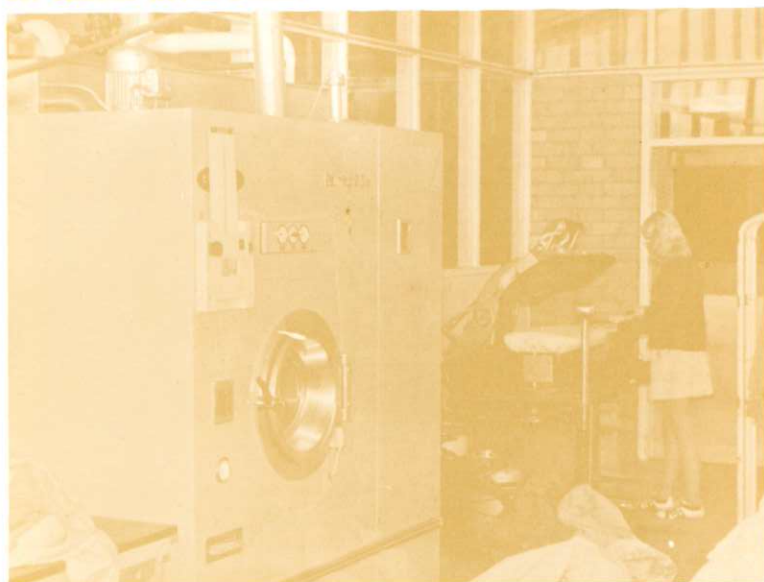
Ancillary Services:
