

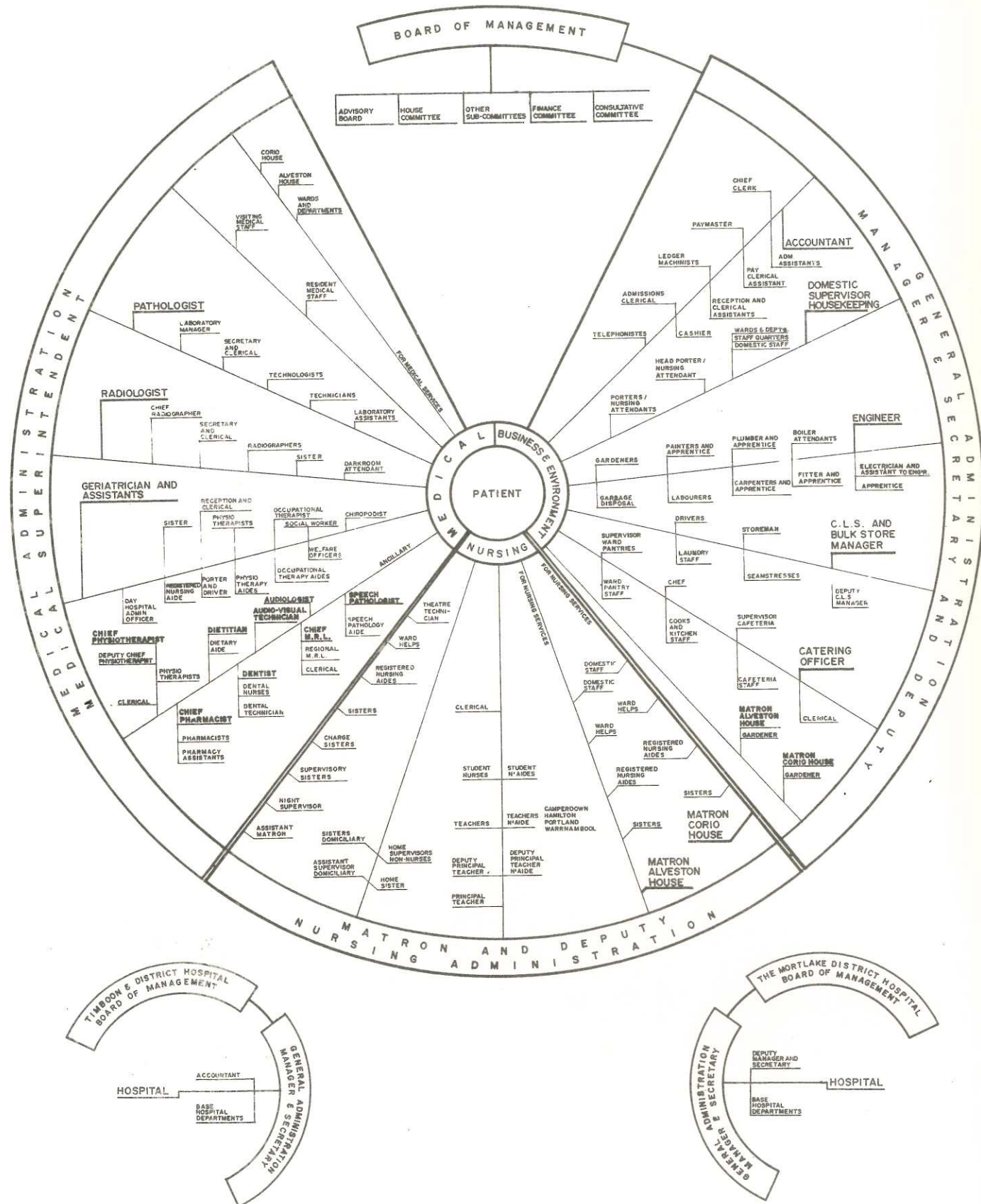

126th Annual Report

TO THE LIFE GOVERNORS AND CONTRIBUTORS

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It gives me pleasure to present the 126th Annual Report of the Warrnambool & District Base Hospital, Alveston House and Corio House, for the financial year ended 30th June, 1980.

In spite of the no growth and cost containment policies imposed by the government during the past three years, the Board has succeeded in maintaining all services without reduction, and by careful management has even effected some improvements.

Pensioners eligible to receive hearing aids free of charge from the National Acoustics Laboratory can now be supplied with their aids at the hospital immediately after assessment.

Negotiations are taking place with the Health Commission to establish a branch laboratory at the Camperdown Hospital, with the view to providing a more efficient diagnostic service for patients in that area of the region.

Facilities have been provided where parents may leave their children whilst they visit relatives in hospital or attend the casualty or outpatient departments. As a beginning, volunteer workers are minding the children during the afternoon visiting hours on week days.

Nursing staff have been trained and equipment installed at the District Nursing Service in Hider Street, to provide a haemo dialysis service for a local repatriation patient.

Arrangements have been made for a member of the resident medical staff to be available for transport by ambulance to the scene of any accident involving critically injured patients.

Initial steps are being taken to establish a professional library for use by all Base Hospital departments and also by regional hospitals.

All of these measures further extend the Board of Management's objective to provide a comprehensive health service for the citizens of Warrnambool and District, and to ensure that specialist and other support services are readily available to district hospitals throughout the Corangamite Region.

BUILDINGS:

The new Special Care Ward of twenty beds above the Kitchen, and extensions to the Intensive Care Unit were completed early in 1980. The total cost of this project amounting to \$687,942 was paid entirely from our own funds with no financial assistance whatsoever from the government. Immediately after a public "Open Day" on March 16th, 1980, patients were transferred into the ward by the nursing staff in a most efficient manner. Funds for additional nurses to staff this new area were not available, therefore quite extensive movement of other patients was also necessary to make it possible for one of the old sandstone, pavilion type wards, to be closed.

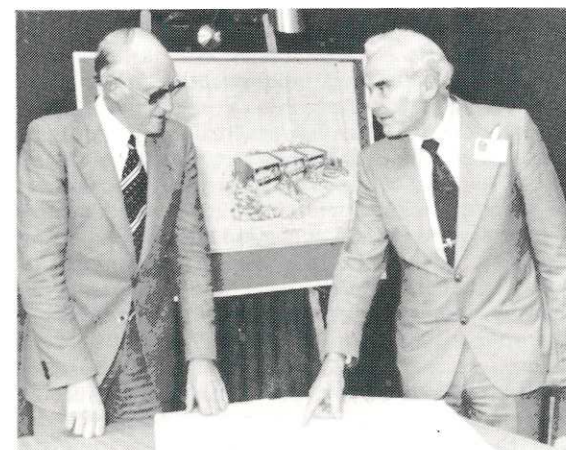

Dialogue and negotiation with the Health Commission continues in an endeavour to gain approval and some government monies to finalise quite urgent requirements in relation to:—

Upgrading of Operating Theatre and Air Conditioning Plant;
Expansion of Steam Generator Plant;
Telephone Service — New P.A.B.X.;
Emergency Power Plant;
Radiology Equipment;
Further upgrading of Fire Services.

The final stage of the building development programme involves the replacement of the remaining old sandstone buildings with a modern structure. Staff members have been involved in extensive planning of this undertaking for some time, and sketches, prepared by our architect, have already been submitted to the Health Commission for comment. This planned development involves multi million dollar expenditure, therefore protracted negotiation with the Health Commission is likely before a start can be made. The Board intends to pursue this venture with vigour in order to ensure that modern facilities are made available for the care of all patients as quickly as possible. Fundamentally the scheme involves replacement of medical ancillary areas,

Day Hospital, Rehabilitation Ward and Mortuary, with provision for expansion of the Operating Theatre and Central Sterile Supply Department and relocation of the Pathology Laboratory.

STAFF:

The medical Superintendent vacancy has proved to be a difficult position to fill. Although extensively advertised in daily newspapers and medical journals, a permanent appointment has not been made. Doctor J. Kempler, Specialist Pathologist carried out the essential duties from October, 1979 until June, 1980, in a part-time capacity. Doctor John O'Callaghan, Specialist Physician has accepted responsibility for this most important post, also on a part-time basis, until February, 1981, and Doctor Andrew Ross, Specialist Anaesthetist has assisted when required. The Board is extremely grateful to these senior members of staff who have willingly accepted an additional workload in administration, although already heavily committed to the demands of their particular medical specialties. We will continue in our endeavours to recruit a doctor to accept responsibility for the medical administration of the hospital in a full-time capacity.

Nursing administration has remained stable under the efficient leadership of the Director, Miss Stewart and her Deputy, Miss Taylor. Miss Edgar has joined Miss Hawker as Assistant Director which adds further strength to the control and organisation of the nursing service.

During July, 1980 two vital positions in the general service departments became vacant due to the retirement of Mr. W. A. Bedggood, Chief Engineer for thirty-nine years, and Mrs. J.H. Horwood, Domestic Services Supervisor with twenty-five years of service. Mr. Leo Ryan, previously Chief Engineer at Wimmera Base Hospital has replaced Mr. Bedggood and Mr. Alan Joy who was Cleaning Foreman at the Alfred Hospital for a number of years has been appointed Domestic Services Supervisor. We welcome these new heads of department to Warrnambool and trust that they gain satisfaction and pleasure from their association with this hospital.

Mr. Ron Earl, Central Linen Service Manager and Mr. Frank Kelly, Food Services Manager, conduct busy departments which continue to provide first rate services in support of the patient care programme.

The nursing home units, Alveston House and Corio House, are a vital link in our health care service. The demanding task of caring for the aged and infirm is conducted in a compassionate and expert manner under the leadership of their Directors of Nursing, Mrs Bruce and Mrs. Johnson.

The services of the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education are being utilized to assist with the various staff education programmes. Development courses for the departmental heads and newly graduated nurses have been conducted and Institute lecturers are assisting with the teaching of appropriate subjects in the School of Nursing. Counselling services also have been made available by the Institute to our student nurses when required. The recommendations arising from the Federal Enquiry into Nurse Education and Training have stimulated the Board to further foster this relationship with W.I.A.E.

Fund Raising — Capital Account:

Government finance for capital works, which include major items of plant, have not been available in 1979/80 and the same situation is expected to continue in 1980/81. Plant items mentioned earlier in this report are becoming matters of some urgency, therefore the Board must seek contributions from the community on a continuing basis for funds to maintain hospital facilities at an acceptable level of operation.

The 1980 3YB Appeal culminating on Sunday, June 22nd, was generously supported and our sincere thanks are extended to Mr. Jack Walker, 3YB Manager, and his staff for conducting the Appeal in the usual efficient and effective manner. The total contributions received for all hospitals was \$149,489 with this hospital and its annexes receiving the following shares:

Finance — Operating Account:

The operating fund figures detailed below show cash surpluses for all three institutions at 30th June, 1980. Unfortunately however, actual expenditure by the Base Hospital was \$48,000 in excess of the Health Commission allocation for the period. The reasons for this overspending have been documented and explained to the Commission and we are hopeful that a refund adjustment to the State Treasury can be avoided.

Statistics:

Figures indicate a steady decline in demand for inpatient services with a corresponding increase in the use of District Nursing Services. This trend is no doubt the direct result of government policy during recent years, which has been to provide more comprehensive domiciliary and day care services. The objective of course, is to reduce the demand for expensive inpatient facilities to as great a degree as possible.

Total amount of money raised by all auxiliaries during the financial year was \$31,145.

In conclusion I wish to acknowledge the services of the Manager and Secretary, Mr. A. Matthews and his Deputy, Mr. Bill Vaughan for their help during the year and trust that the standard and extent of our hospital service can be maintained at the same level in 1980/81.

Medical Superintendent's Report

The opening of the new Special Care Ward 5 with its modernized facilities for isolation and barrier nursing of infectious patients and its secondary function of acting as a surgical convalescent ward, was the highlight of the current year. The changes in the geriatric bed distribution necessitated by this, are mentioned elsewhere, in Dr. Blake's report.

During the year we welcomed to the Visiting Medical Staff Dr. Nick Thies, who is our first consultant Paediatrician and a former Resident Medical Officer of this hospital in 1971/1972. (Subsequently he has been overseas and has spent the last four years at the Royal Childrens Hospital in Melbourne). Dr. Ian Barratt, a highly competent and conscientious Resident Medical Officer in 1978 and 1979, has joined Dr. Awburn's group and will also be an acquisition to the hospital staff.

Doctor Peter Morton left us for Port Lincoln in South Australia in October, 1979. He was our first full time Medical Superintendent and responsible for many innovations, especially concerning the Hospital's involvement with the local community. Subsequently Dr. J. Kempler acted as Superintendent until June, 1980 in a most competent and efficient manner, combining this with his duties as Specialist Pathologist.

Our Resident Medical Officer establishment is currently twelve. The number of Interns was this year increased from five to six, the sixth being employed chiefly in Marcus Saltau House (Ward 6)

where this innovation has been very well received. The five Junior Resident Medical Officers include one rotating through a group practice under the Family Medicine Programme and another doing a term at Brierly Psychiatric Hospital. There is a senior Resident Medical Officer (3rd year after graduation) acting as rotating locum relieving relatively isolated doctors in the area. The cut back in surgical training posts has led to the loss of the rotating surgical registrar from Prince Henry's Hospital.

The Accreditation Surveyors reviewed our hospital at the beginning of July, 1980 and their assessment and recommendations are awaited with interest.

Visiting speakers from Prince Henry's Hospital during the year included: Professor R. Atkins, Nephrologist, Mr. G. Reisner, Urologist, Dr. M. Korman, Gastroenterologist, Mr. P. Hunt, Surgeon, Dr. V. Thompson, Physician, Dr. S. Scott, Vascular Surgeon, Dr. G. Parkin, Director of the Intensive Care Unit at Prince Henry's Hospital and Mr. E. Cooper, Thoracic Surgeon.

In addition the following speakers visited the hospital during the year: Dr. J. McNamara, Mr. G. S. Gunter, Dr. J. Mathew, Dr. J.F. Cade, Dr. D. Kochar, Mr. D.R.V. Dickens, Dr. B. Entwistle, Dr. D.C. Burke, Dr. R. Larkins, Dr. R. Rosanove and Dr. C. Eccles-Smith from the Commonwealth Department of Health.

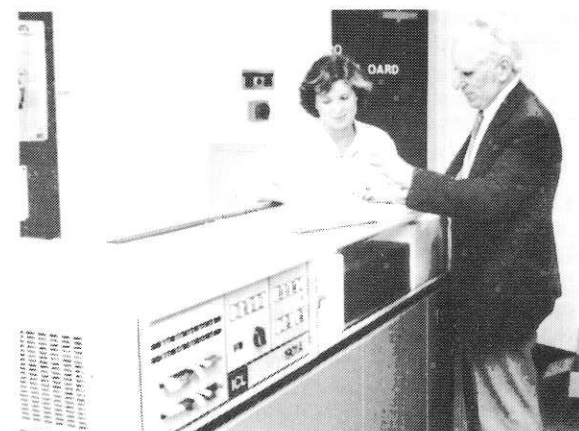

The Medical Library had been extremely run down in recent years. Mrs. Anne Webb, a trainee librarian from the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education, is currently here on a part time basis cataloguing the library contents. The library itself has been moved into the previous Medical Records Department giving more space. The Library Committee has recommenced regular meetings with a view to completely renewing and updating texts and appropriate journals. It is hoped that ultimately all aspects of the hospital, medical, nursing and administrative, can be combined in the same library, serviced by a full time Librarian. The Health Commission Regional Librarian is proving most helpful and encouraging in this regard.

The Medical Records Department, under the capable administration of Miss Gabrielle Waters, attracted high praise from the Accreditation Surveyors, who considered the system was excellent.

Miss Kerrie Hickey, the Regional Medical Record Administrator, resigned on the 7th March, 1980 and unfortunately no replacement for her has been found as yet. However, two Medical Records Administration students from the Lincoln Institute will be bonded to the hospital from early next year.

The Medical Records Department has completed many new procedures and the introduction of the new label printing computer has increased efficiency of the labelling system. The medical record systems in the regional hospitals are still being maintained from the Medical Records Department at Warrnambool, but all six regional hospitals now have computerized systems established which are functioning well. The department has recently moved to the new area above the kitchen on the mezzanine floor and now occupies two rooms which greatly relieves the space shortage.

The hospital dental staff now consists of two dentists, Dr. Bill Robertson and Dr. Michael Silva. There are also three nurses and three dental technicians. The dental staff now visits the Timboon

Community Health Centre on a weekly basis. Seventy-one patients received orthodontic treatment during the year from Dr. Black, the visiting Orthodontist. There were a total of 6,228 attendances to the clinic during the year 2,484 teeth were restored and 280 dentures made.

The Welfare Department continues to provide an important service. Welfare Officers, Mrs. E.J. Taylor and Mrs. E. Savery have completed another busy year. In excess of 1,523 patients have been assisted by the Welfare Department this year with consultations totalling 3,322.

Mrs. Savery completed her term of duty with the hospital on the 4th July, 1980 and is now employed in a part time capacity by the Meals on Wheels Committee. She will continue to be located at the hospital and will attend to all welfare and co-ordinating duties associated with the distribution of meals on wheels. Many elderly people would be unable to continue in their own homes without meals on wheels.

A child minding centre has been organized by Mrs. Taylor and equipped by Miss Judy Adams, the Occupational Therapist. It is situated in the now vacated former Ward 6 and is open from 2.00 p.m. to 4.00 p.m. Monday to Friday with volunteers from the community caring for the children. It is available for children while adults visit people in the hospital and when the Outpatients Department is attended by another member of the family.

Miss Barbara Clark, Social Worker, commenced duty in July, 1980 and with her background of expertise in psychology and community experience, is already proving a considerable asset to this hospital. Liaison, particularly with the District Nursing Service, is close and valuable.

Unfortunately, we lost the services of Mrs. Liz Waters and Mr. Jon Clegg from the Speech Therapy Department at the end of June, 1980. We wish them well in their new adventure. Mrs. Lorraine Ceddia (nee Sheehan) has been working extremely hard and efficiently under difficulties in the department since then. She is currently receiving part time aide assistance from Mrs. Veida Jack.

The staff shortage has meant that the number of patients seen in the department has decreased

considerably. There are now 35 patients on the waiting list requiring urgent therapy and a further 95 patients to be seen on a review basis. Many of these patients require regular therapy, but this is not currently available.

A full establishment of three speech therapists is anticipated in 1981. It is hoped that the long waiting list will be considerably reduced, but many children who require therapy are unlikely to receive this for about twelve months. Where necessary, home programmes have been designed for many patients until they can be seen for regular therapy.

Five students from the Lincoln Institute School of Communication Disorders spent time training in the Speech Therapy Department during the year. A regional service to Timboon commenced in August, 1979 and is currently being carried on by Speech Pathologists from the Warrnambool Education Department.

Lectures were given to kindergarten and other teachers, Infant Welfare Sisters, Home Help trainees, Nurses and parent groups this year. An intensive stuttering programme was also carried out. The results of this programme have proved to be more satisfactory than conventional weekly therapy and similar programmes will be instituted for all stuttering patients in the future.

The Audiology Department, under the capable direction of Mr. George Lancaster, continues to expand. There have been 2,257 attendances at the clinic, 992 pre-school children have been screened and 729 N.A.L. pensioner clients. Arrangements have now been completed to permit all pensioners in South Western Victoria eligible for free Government hearing aids to be assessed, fitted with hearing prostheses and given appropriate after care by the Audiologist.

Mr. Lancaster has given numerous talks to service groups, schools and hospitals around the area. He has also undertaken aural rehabilitation courses for hard of hearing people in the community and conducts aural rehabilitation programmes for pensioners at the hospital in conjunction with Mrs. Ceddia.

This year has seen further expansion in the Pharmacy Department with the purchase of a con-

siderable amount of new equipment. Mr. Greg Weeks, the Chief Pharmacist, has been overseas studying at the Bradford University for an M.Sc. in clinical Pharmacy. Mr. Allan Luke has capably acted as Chief Pharmacist during his absence. Miss M. Lee has been here since January, 1980 and shortly leaves for Melbourne. Miss L. Ponting and Mr. N. Ferrier, together with a trainee pharmacist Mr. L. Thomas, and pharmacy assistants Mrs. McKenna and Mrs. Foster, complete a hard working and capable staff.

Two new unit dose trollies have been purchased and are functioning in wards 2 and 6 enabling the nursing staff to distribute medication more efficiently, accurately and quickly.

The rapid cool autoclave has been installed in a redesigned special fluids room, saving considerable time in the manufacture of topical sterile solutions. The laminar flow room has had a clean air module fitted, which will further improve the quality of total parenteral nutrition and Cytotoxic and Iron intravenous solutions prepared. The solutions prepared number approximately 40 per month which is a considerable increase over last year.

The Occupational Therapy Department has had a year of further development and progress owing in part to a more stable full staff establishment thus improving task handling.

The Specialist Geriatrician's report details some of the improvements during the year as the work load gradually increases with awareness of the services provided. In particular the domiciliary service is coping very well with the greatest demands placed on it for some time.

The home visiting team visits up to five homes in the district in an afternoon installing handrails, shower-seats, completing small alterations and checking home safety. This system is unique in that we employ no handyman, as do many other hospitals. We prefer to do such work ourselves using the skills of former tradesman (electrician) John Goodwin, the Occupational Therapy Aide. Advantages of such a system are many: We avoid communication problems with tradesmen, the clients are not faced with expensive bills, and we know first hand the situations we send our patients home to.

Mr. John Goodwin, our valuable Health Assistant, has completed the Mayfield Allied Health Assistants Course. We have again played a part in the training of Lincoln Institute and Mayfield students.

In the Physiotherapy Department Director, Mr. Tony Grace, has recently been overseas and has been capably relieved by his brother Paul. Craig Allingham has departed to Melbourne and Karen Wilde has retired to motherhood.

Recent graduates, Miss Carolyn Dillon and Miss Lee Carlon commenced work in September 1979, while Miss Jane Torry has rejoined the department after overseas travel. Miss Janet Hose has been appointed Physiotherapist in charge of the Day Hospital whilst Mr. Ian Waters, amongst other work, continues to give valuable assistance with the riding for the disabled group and is involved in teaching swimming to a group of handicapped people.

The Dietetic Department has continued to function efficiently under the management of Miss Claire Martin and Mrs. Karen Manley. Visits to outlying hospitals, as well as both inpatient and outpat-

ient care at this hospital, are the main activities of this department, which also provides an on-call service. Supervision of Diet Kitchen special diets, including those for meals on wheels, is carried out.

The Dietetic Department is highly involved with the local community and one or other of the Dietitians has addressed many groups about the various aspects of nutrition during the last year. The department has close association with the Diabetic Association in Warrnambool.

Mrs. Karen Manley has attended Deakin University this year completing a Bachelor of Science course. As a research project she is doing an important survey on the relationship between salt intake and hypertension in a sample of the local community.

Mr. Robert Moore's Audiovisual Unit has grown considerably during the last year and continues to be one of the outstanding departments of this hospital and of the region.

The Audiovisual Library now contains 43 programmes, many locally produced, others donated by production units such as the Family Medicine Programme or by Drug Companies. The Health Commission's regional library is about to commence distribution of programmes produced by our Audiovisual Unit which will allow broader dissemination of material.

Two films of medical and surgical interest have been completed. "Umbilical Arterial Catheterization" with Dr. Ivor Scott demonstrating a method of readily obtaining blood samples from premature babies and "Surgery of Pelvic Hydatids" with Hamilton Surgeon, Mr. Barry Aarons, showing a unique method of removing dangerous hydatid cysts. Both films have been included in the Brownless Medical Library at Melbourne University and the hydatids film has been widely shown to surgical conferences throughout Australia.

Topics of use in nurse training have also been completed, including slides on proper methods of drug administration and a videotape about nursing aide examination techniques.

The Education Unit at the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education has been of

great assistance in providing video production and copying facilities. The AVEC centre and the Audiovisual Unit at the Family Medicine Programme have also provided technical assistance on several occasions.

At present there are 14 projects undergoing production, including programmes about infection control in hospitals, the limb prosthesis service being provided by the Occupational Therapy Department, and the attitudes of hospital staff and the public to the dying. One major project is a community awareness film about hydatid disease and methods for its prevention. Filming is mainly at Casterton and Hamilton, and the film features Mr. Samuel Fitzpatrick, a world authority on hydatid disease.

Health Education will feature largely in new productions by the Audiovisual Unit within the next year.

The Infection Control Committee, in particular Mr. David McKenzie and Sister Virginia Lange, with assistance from Dr. J. Kempler, deserve great credit for the production of the Infection Control Manual which coincided with the opening of the new Special Care Ward and gives an excellent up to date guide to infection control procedures.

In conclusion I would like to thank the President and members of the Board of Management, the Director of Nursing, Miss June Stewart, the Manager and Secretary, Mr. Allan Matthews, and colleagues for their ever present help and advice in recent months. Dr. Douglas Blake has been of great assistance in the Geriatric Department while my deputy, Dr. Andrew Ross, is always available for practical help, especially in Resident training in addition to his onerous role as Director of Intensive Care and Specialist Anaesthetist.

During this year, Miss Jane Rounsevell, the first of the holders of a Hospital Bursary for radiography training, completed her full-time course in Melbourne, and commenced work with the department. We were unfortunate to lose the services of Mrs. Marilyn Cameron and Mr. Anthony Baulch, both of whom had trained in the department under the previous apprenticeship type of radiographer training, which was replaced by a full-time course at R.M.I.T. in 1978.

The loss of the two qualified technicians would have meant that we were extremely short staffed, but we were fortunate in being able to rapidly employ Mr. Graeme Osborne from Central Gippsland Hospital in Traralgon and Miss Carolyn Howell from the Royal Adelaide Hospital. We welcome these young people to our staff and look forward to working with them.

Radiology in general continues to go through a very rapid period of technological change, with continuing further exploration of the application of ultrasound and C.T. scanning to diagnosis. One of the difficulties of assessing the significance of these newer technologies is that the application of them is undergoing continual evolution and change, and it will be some time before they can be seen in true perspective.

One important factor in the ready acceptance of application of these newer imaging techniques has been their extension to the use of interventional therapeutic procedures such as tumor embolization, control of G.I. bleeding, dilation and controlled biopsy techniques into a variety of sites. These methods will probably turn out, in the long run, to be the real advantage of these new imaging systems.

In order to keep abreast of these changes, both Dr. Rogan and myself have availed ourselves of well balanced continuing education programs, conducted by the Royal Australasian College of Radiologists and the Australian Society for Ultrasound in Biology and Medicine, and both have attended conferences on these subjects in the preceding 12 months.

Earlier in the year, Mr. Ziegeler attended a course in Management of Radiological Environments conducted by Kodak Pty. Ltd. As a result of this course, a program of quality control is soon to be introduced into the department. This program is designed to ensure the continuing high quality of service with an appreciable reduction in the cost of film and equipment maintenance.

The staff of the X-Ray Department look forward to providing continuing service from an expanded and redecorated work area which has been a boost to our morale and will make our work easier in the future.

Radiologist's Report

We certainly do live in a rapidly changing world, but nonetheless, these days change of any magnitude still takes time. Alas we still have not occupied the space allocated to us from the old Physiotherapy Department, but the noise of the workmen, who are very active in this area at the present time, is encouraging and we certainly should be established in this area before the next annual report.

In the meantime, the X-Ray Department is gradually undergoing a refurbishing with paint, tiling and new soft furnishings to be installed in some areas. These improvements have already been completed in some non-patient areas and the improved environment is very pleasing to myself and all the staff who work in this area.

For the first time in 20 years there has been no increase in the number of cases examined in the department in the last 12 months. There are many factors responsible, and among them I would cite firstly, the use of ultrasound for diagnostic investigations instead of x-rays, secondly, the re-establishment of the x-ray service at St. John of God Hospital, and thirdly, the present unsatisfactory state of the health insurance scheme. Despite this fall in total numbers of examinations, we are still experiencing an increased demand for special investigations which require a disproportionate amount of time, particularly Radiologist's time, and these facts have been allowed for in the proposed department extensions.

Our oldest generator, which had been shifted twice in its working lifetime, was finally replaced, after more than forty years of service in this department. This long life is really a tribute to the excellent service maintained on this equipment by its manufacturers, Ultrays Australia Pty. Ltd., and I believe that the new generator which has replaced it, also from the same source, should last equally as well.

Pathologist's Report

Of the activities of the Pathology Department over the past 12 months the following deserve mention:

Staff turnover was of the same order as previous years. Those who resigned, technical assistant Glenda Brock and laboratory clerks, Sue Parkinson and Alison Boland are thanked for their services and best wishes are extended to their replacements.

There was, overall a continuation of the steady increase in workload, periodic surges of which challenged the Department's capacity. The prior acquisition of automated equipment, in biochemistry and haematology proved fortunate indeed.

Each division participated in internal and external quality control programs, including those seen by the College of Pathologists of Australia. Results have been most gratifying.

Attendance of seminars etc. by qualified staff is encouraged and has helped to keep the Department abreast of recent developments.

A project into which senior staff have made major input is the current extension and re-arrangement of the Department. This has been made possible by the transfer of the formerly adjacent Physiotherapy.

As well as providing much needed laboratory space this will result in the creation of an outpatient's waiting room, a better storage area and re-location of the Pathologist's office.

DIVISIONAL REPORTS 1979/80.

Haematology — 13,987 specimens were analysed, a slight increase on the 13,092 of the previous year. New equipment purchased included a Nikon Labophot Microscope and a Linson Haemoglobinometer. The latter is used primarily for screening blood donors for haemoglobin level.

During the year the Technologist in Haematology attended a two-day seminar on Blood banking serology.

Histopathology and Morbid Anatomy — 95 post-mortem examinations were conducted, slightly fewer than the previous year. There were 2,188 biopsy specimens, representing a slight increase.

Microbiology — Although the number of specimens processed by the Microbiology Department did not increase significantly over 1978-79, being this year 14,107, the year was not without new developments.

New Media and diagnostic kits were introduced into the working routine. They included media for isolating *Campylobacter*, *Dermatophytes* and *Neisseria* and kits for the elaboration of *Streptococci* and non-fermenting oxidative aerobes.

During the year Ms. Liston attended an extensive seminar on the Preparation and Quality Control of Microbiological Media.

The Department has been active in the field of Control of Hospital Infection, through the relevant Committee: Sister Lange of C.S.S.D., was actively assisted by Mr. McKenzie in compiling a comprehensive Infection Control Manual. This has now been distributed throughout the hospital and the region.

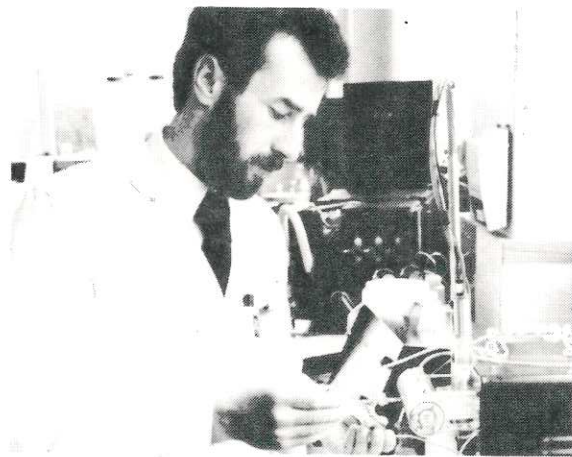
The booklet of Antibiotic Guidelines, drawn up by an Expert Working Party and published by the Health Commission was received recently. After slight modifications addressed to local conditions printing of multiple copies was organised. This pocket-sized publication should prove of immense practical benefit.

Finally, Mr. McKenzie is to be congratulated for his success in gaining membership of the Australian Society of Microbiology.

Biochemistry — Tests corresponding to 18,668 patients were processed during the year. This represents approximately 56,000 tests or 1,100 tests per week.

Alternative data management systems are being considered in order to cope with the volume of clerical work involved in reporting these tests.

A new radioimmunoassay laboratory is currently being fitted out. This will allow for the expansion in the range of R.I.A., tests which has taken place and relieve the presently overcrowded chemistry areas.

Blood Bank — The total of 1,716 blood donations represents a significant rise over the previous year. The country centres of Terang, Camperdown, Timboon, Port Fairy and Mortlake accounted for 690 of these. The efforts of the many medical and nursing staff involved is gratefully acknowledged as is the contribution of voluntary helpers. Amongst these Mr. Mervyn Ritchie and his St. John Ambulance aides should be singled out.

Marion Bowman left as Sister-In-Charge of the Warrnambool donor sessions and has been replaced by Sister Robyn Carroll whose appointment has proved to be most satisfactory.

Geriatrician's Report

This year, because of the economic restrictions, so far as the Geriatric and Rehabilitation Services are concerned, has been mainly one of containment. All of the facilities previously provided have been continued. There has, however, been one major advance, and that has been in the area of prosthetics. Under the expertise of Mr. T. Soawyer a temporary below-knee prosthesis has been developed, which is proving highly successful in geriatric patients, enabling many elderly amputees to be able to regain mobility and independence.

In order to make way for the proposed future hospital re-building programme, the short-term geriatric beds have been transferred from old Ward 7 to present Ward 8 (previously Ward 4). The change over

A major advance in cross-matching technique was introduced some 12 months ago. This L.I.S.S., method is of proven reliability and takes 15-20 minutes to perform as against the 1½ hours of the older technique. This shortened time means that in a high percentage of cases "Group (screen) and Hold" can replace a request for cross-match. This in turn ensures that far less blood is wasted.

Finally, thanks are due to all the Donors over the past 12 months. Their unstinting support, particularly at times of acute demand has been of immeasurable benefit to the community.

took place smoothly and has not meant the loss of any patient facilities, apart from the fact that, for technical reasons, we lost most of our 'high-low' beds. All of the high beds in Ward 8, however, are to be replaced by new 'high-low' beds as soon as these can be supplied by the manufacturers.

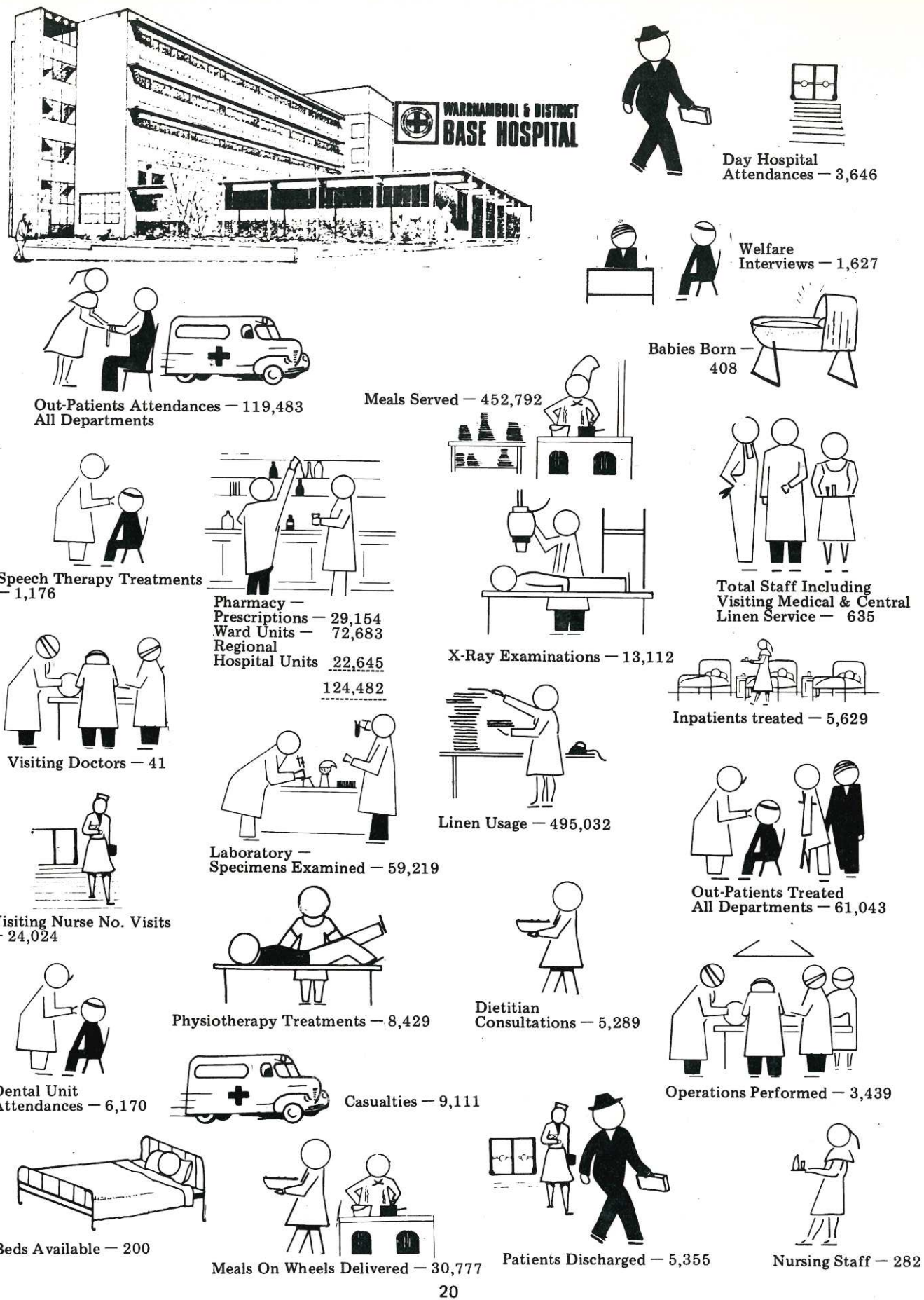
There have been the usual staff changes during the year. Miss Kenna resigned on 12.7.79 to take up appointment at Caulfield Hospital, and Mrs. B. Allingham who has moved with her husband to Melbourne, resigned in December 1979. The department lost 2 valuable occupational therapists leaving a gap in occupational therapy services for several months. The gap has now been very satisfactorily filled by the appointments of Miss S. Scott and Miss J. Adams. Mrs. Quigley resumed duties on a part-time basis to maintain podiatry services until the hospital's bursary student qualifies to take up a full-time position at the end of the year. Mrs. Savery was appointed as a part-time Welfare Officer, in conjunction with her meals-on-wheels duties, on a twelve months basis to replace Mrs. Witham, who retired, after many years of faithful service to the hospital, in July 1979. Mr. J. Goodwin, occupational therapy aide, successfully completed the Health Assistants' course at Lincoln Institute in October 1979, so that the Department now has 2 qualified health assistants, one in occupational therapy and one in physiotherapy.

During the year there were 6,519 attendances at the Day Hospital; 180 new Day Hospital patients; 115 short-term patient admissions; and 160 new patient referrals to the Specialist Geriatrician.

I would like to thank all the staff working in the Day Hospital, Ward 8, Ward 9, Alveston House and Corio House, who have, regardless of any economic restrictions which may have been necessary, maintained a high level of professional service, both to the patients and to the hospital; and to the District Nursing Service and Hospital Welfare Department whose contributions to the complete care, of the geriatric patients in particular, are so vital.
