

131st Annual Report

TO THE LIFE GOVERNORS AND CONTRIBUTORS.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It gives me great pleasure to present the 131st Annual Report of the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital and its Nursing Home Annexe "Corio House" for the period 1st July, 1984 to the 30th

This year, like the previous two, has been quite a remarkable year in health care with many changes and new directions to follow.

Highlights of the year may be listed as follows:

1. A YEAR OF INDUSTRIAL TURMOIL

Health services around the State have been greatly affected this year by industrial turmoil. This has been far more apparent in the Metropolitan area, and this together with the hospital waiting list problem, and the inability of many hospitals to recruit sufficient numbers of nursing staff has created wide publicity. Thankfully, our Base Hospital has not had to reduce services to patients, nor at present do we have a waiting list. It appears however that nursing staff are becoming more difficult to attract to this area of Victoria, a factor which may have repercussions on our future.

For several months early in the year, the nonnursing duties bans did mean that the Hospital had to rely on volunteers to carry out certain duties in order to keep the Hospital operating. This was successful, and once again I thank those forty (40) people who so willingly gave of their time. Temporary staff were also utilized during the dispute, and we were pleased that an additional

9.8 people were allocated to the Hospital by the Health Commission working party in February of this year. This was a first round allocation, and we do expect a further allocation to cover catering

I would take this opportunity to commend the Management of the Hospital and the local Hospital Unions Representatives for their willingness to meet regularly with each other. This attitude can only be for the good of the Hospital.

2. THE ENQUIRY INTO NURSING

The Committee of Enquiry into Nursing, headed by Mr. John McClelland, presented its report to the Minister on 12th August of 1985. This long awaited report addresses many of the issues involving the nursing profession and contains a number of recommendations for problem solving. Our Board of Management through its Nursing Administration has also taken a number of important measures to ensure that we not only attract, but that we can retain nursing staff. These measures include nurse refresher courses, ongoing inservice education, security and safety improvements and we are currently exploring the areas of nurse car-parking, child minding facilities and more attractive rostering arrangements.

3. THE "SWING" TO MEDICARE

The Hospital has continued to experience the effects of the "Swing" to Medicare. Prior to the introduction of Medicare, 46% of our inpatients were hospital patients. This figure now stands at 57%. Whilst all patients receive the same standard of treatment, it is the Hospital's responsibility to finance the Hospital Patients Medical Treatment, and as a consequence, Hospital costs by way of payments to Visiting Medical Staff have risen sharply. We are hopeful of receiving Health Department reimbursement of these additional commitments.

(NOTE: Private and third party patients have decreased correspondingly from 54% to 43%).

4. REGIONALIZATION OF HEALTH SERVICES

The move towards the Regionalization of Health Services has continued. A Regional Office has been established in Geelong with the Regional Director Mr. John McClelland, and a small contingent of staff now being the first point of contact and decision making for the Barwon and South Western Region. Mr. McClelland already has a detailed knowledge of the Region and its needs, and we look forward to working with him on developing a role statement for the Hospital, together with the goals and objectives for the ensuing year.

Another facet of Regionalization, the establishment of District Health Councils, was brought to the attention of the community through the discussion booklets released in November, 1984. Community groups were given the opportunity to learn more about this aspect through various public meetings, and we now await the establishment of these councils which are designed to give both providers and consumers an input into the broad range of Health matters which affect the community.

5. COLLEGE BASED NURSING EDUCATION

This has been a long held objective of the Base Hospital, and I am now able to report that it is a reality.

The decision has been made by the Government, that the education of registered nurses will become college based and that staged transfer from hospitals will take place up to 1993. Warrnambool is amongst the first to be involved in the transfer, and it has been announced that the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education will commence its nurse education course in early 1986. Our last intake for Hospital based training will therefore be 1985. We will continue to train State Enrolled Nurses, and our Hospital will be one of the major facilities utilized for the Institute nursing students to gain their practical experience.

The Warrnambool and District Base Hospital has been training registered nurses for 58 years, and we will therefore be sad to see the end of such an era. However, we fully support the initiative to transfer, and we look forward to continuing our close working relationship with the Institute.

6. NEW MINISTER FOR HEALTH

Following the State Election earlier this year, Mr. David White, M.L.C. succeeded Mr. Tom Roper as Minister for Health. Mr. White is obviously very keen to overcome the major problems facing the Health Industry, and has quickly applied himself to the matter of hospital waiting lists, industrial aspects of health, and nursing staff shortages. We certainly see these as major issues, and look forward to them being overcome.

7. PATIENT CARE

Our main aim is to provide a high quality of patient care to the people of Warrnambool and District, and to serve as a Regional Referral Hospital, consequently we are constantly seeking to improve our standards, and the range of services offered to our patients. One measurement of the standard of patient care available to us is the accreditation system. This is provided by the Australian Council on Hospital Standards, and involves a detailed survey by experienced Health Administrators once every three (3) years. We are currently a fully accredited Hospital, and we shall be undergoing accreditation re-survey in May 1986.

The Hospital provides a wide range of inpatient and diagnostic and emergency services, but one of our most important responsibilites is also to develop outreach or community based services. This will serve to maintain and treat people in their own environments and in many cases obviate the need for expensive institutional treatment. A Hospital stay can also be shortened where appropriate services can be extended to the home.

Many of our staff members are involved in community initiatives to establish health related services such as the Warrnambool Regional Association for Alcohol and Drug dependence, the proposed Sexual Assault Unit, the Cancer Carers Group, the Ostomy Clinic and so on. The Board encourages staff to be part of these initiatives and the Hospital assists where it can with Administrative support, clinic areas and meeting venues.

Another of the Board's major functions is to ensure the provision of a comprehensive range of medical specialities, so that the community can obtain its general health services locally. It is recognized that there is cost benefit and convenience in this aim, whilst at the same time the place for the super specialities is the Metropolitan area.

Last year in the Annual Report, I made mention of the recruitment of additional Specialists, and I am pleased to say that this objective is almost complete — save for the specialities of orthopaedic surgery and psychiatry.

Appointments of the Visiting Medical Staff were advertised toward the end of this year for the 1985/88 triennium. Clinical privileges have been delineated and appointments confirmed.

We now have the services of two (2) Specialist Anaesthetists — Drs. G. Brown and K. Prest, supported by four General Practitioner Anaesthetists — and we have established an Anaesthetics Department.

Dr. Ian Pettigrew and Dr. Chris Beaton, two Specialist Obstetricians and Gynaecologists were also appointed to the Visiting Medical Staff during this year, and Dr. Stephen Fischer also commenced practice as a third General Surgeon.

Radiological services continue to be provided by Drs. Rafferty and Rogan and one of the major projects during the year has been to compile a detailed submission for the installation of a Computerised Axial Tomography (C.T.) Scanning Unit into the Hospital.

This involved Architectural and Financial considerations, and I am pleased to advise that the submission is now at the Health Department awaiting approval.

Currently residents in this part of the State must travel long distances to either Melbourne, Geelong or Ballarat for this particular service. Sub-regional initiatives also emerged during the year, whereby it is hoped that joint efforts may help to identify area needs and result in provision of needed services. Regular discussions between the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital, the Hamilton Base Hospital, Portland District Hospital and Mt. Gambier Hospital, S.A. (The Green Triangle Area) now take place. Joint efforts are to be made with regard to Orthopaedic Surgery, Urology and Pshychiatry. Hamilton, Portland and Warrnambool have co-operated in the establishment of a South Western Regional Pathology service and this is one demonstration of the way in which such joint undertakings can succeed.

In May this year, the Hospital was visited by the Critical Care Services Committee — a Ministerial Committee — enquiring into aspects of Intensive Care, Coronary Care, and Emergency Department services provided by major hospitals. We have made a submission through the Committee for a number of equipment and staffing improvements in these areas — for which we are hopeful of obtaining support.

For the benefit of both inpatients and staff—nursing and medical—a Hospital working party was established during the year to formalize admission and discharges policy. Such a policy is the requirement of the Health Department and a useful tool for the Administration of the Hospital in that its purpose is to ensure staff numbers available in the ward areas are commensurate with patient requirements.

8. BUILDING AND PLANT

In last year's report, I gave a detailed account of the financing and construction of the new Boiler House. I can now add to that by saying that this new installation was commissioned in August, 1984, and has been of immense benefit to the Hospital - not only in its capability of providing sufficient steam and hot water for the entire hospital complex - but also for its other important functions. The building houses a most efficient incineration system and the auxiliary emergency power unit for the Hospital. We have been particularly pleased with the latter as we have found it necessary to use it on a number of occasions. There has been wide interest shown in this Boiler House complex from around the State and many inspections from other institutions have been arranged.

Government grants totalling \$149,000 were received under the 1984/85 Minor Works and Equipment Program to assist toward the following projects:

Fire Services — Booster Pump \$49,000 Fire Services — Detectors \$35,000 Fire Services — Smoke Compartments \$36,000 Steam Heating — Nurses' Home \$36,000 This program, which is sponsored by the Health Department, allows the Hospital to make application for funding for projects which do not exceed \$50,000 in cost per project. Although referred to as "Minor" works, in fact the program is a major source of ongoing improvement in the Hospital, particularly in areas of patient and staff safety and security.

Under the Health Department's Major Capital Works Programme, the Hospital is receiving recognition for two initiatives:

(I) Replacement Lift: Marcus Saltau House

This project will have an eventual cost of approximately \$135,000. Funds were received this year for the preparatory consultants documentation for this installation and we shall shortly be in a position to call tenders for the project. The new lift should be functional by 30th June, 1986.

(II) Rehabilitation and Ancillary Developments

A functional brief for this project, which is estimated to cost some \$5 million, has been prepared by the Hospital. We are now entering the second stage of the project and our consultants, Bates, Smart & McCutcheon, will present their feasibility study report prior to Christmas. This is a very exciting project for the Hospital because it will service a number of purposes. A modern rehabilitation unit for inpatients and outpatients can be established on the site, by utilizing space occupied by older, non-functional buildings and at the same time other departments experiencing pressure for space can be upgraded or relocated. This list of departments may include Pathology and Mortuary, Radi-

ology, Medical Records, Administration, Operating Theatre and C.S.S.D. and Pharmacy.

Many other Minor Building renovation projects were completed during the year, many too numerous to mention. Some of the more important though included the upgrading of the Splintshop, extensions to the current outpatient rehabilitation area, upgrading of various areas in the Nurses' Homes and security improvements by way of connecting links between wards and departments. These smaller projects are carried out very capably by our own Maintenance staff under the guidance of Chief Engineer, Mr. Leo Ryan.

9. EQUIPMENT

Frequent proposals are submitted to the Board for new and replacement items of equipment to maintain the patient care programme at a high level of performance. This year the Board has established a three (3) year rolling capital budget for these purposes, which enables efficient planning for purchases in and agreed priority order. A contingency is held for emergency replacements.

Appeal funds and other donations from the community, together with allocations from the Special Purposes Fund (Medical), enables the Board to satisfy most requirements.

10. STAFF

There have been some staff changes in key positions, although in an overall sense the year has been relatively stable.

Medical Superintendent, Dr. Glyn Priddle resigned in June, 1985, taking up an appointment at the Geelong Hospital. Although Dr. Priddle was only at the Hospital for a short period (some eighteen months) he was very active in the area of recruitment of Specialist Medical Staff and we are most grateful for his initiatives. He will be succeeded by Dr. Ian Carson, who is currently Medical Superintendent of the Latrobe Valley Hospital,

Dr. Cosmas Wong resigned his position as Pathologist in April, 1985 — to take up a position in Sydney. Dr. Wong served the Hospital for three (3) years in this capacity. His replacement, Dr. Eric Pihl has now settled in, and will direct the aforementioned South Western Region Pathology Service. We look forward to a long and happy association with Dr. Pihl.

Dr. Paul Mark, who apart from being a Visiting General Practitioner, held a part-time appointment as Director of Emergency Services. Dr. Mark took up a position in Perth, W.A. at the end of

1984 and we are grateful to Visiting Surgeon, Dr. S. Fischer for temporarily assisting us in this

Dr. Noel Bayley commenced early in 1985 as Regional Geriatrician and holds also a Visiting Physicians appointment. Dr. Bayley serves a wide area as Geriatrician, regularly visiting surrounding areas and also holds this appointment at Lyndoch. Dr. Bayley has been instrumental in establishing the Regional Geriatric Assessment Team and he has also been deeply involved in the "Briefing" aspects of the Rehabilitation project referred to earlier. We thank Dr. Reg Sobey for his willingness to act as Regional Geriatrician on a part-time basis between the appointments of Dr. Blake and Dr. Bayley.

In the General Service Departments there has been no change in key positions.

One of the major changes in the Nursing Division has been the promotion of Miss Rita Travers to the position of Principal Nurse Educator, following the resignation of Miss Veronica Broughton, who took up a position in South Australia.

In the Medical Ancillary area, the following have succeeded to head of departments positions:

Dietetics, Mrs. S. Baudinette; Medical Records, Miss M. Fahey; Social Worker, Miss S. Allsopp; Speech Pathology, Miss C. Harvey.

We rely greatly on the professional expertise of all staff and we thank them and each and every department in their integral role in the team approach to patient care.

I would at this point acknowledge that whilst not staff, but a much respected member of our Visiting Medical Officers, Dr. Joe Brookes, Visiting Obstetrician and Gynaecologist left Warrnambool to live overseas. Dr. Brookes contributed greatly to the health care of this area for some twenty (20) years and was accorded a farewell by Hospital Board, Staff and Medical Officers in November.

11. FINANCE

Surplus

Operating results for the Hospital indicate a deficit for the year although Corio House has reported a surplus.

The main reasons for the deficit situation this year, revolve around Medicare effects as alluded

to earlier in the report.

For example in comparison with budget, we exceeded payments to Visiting Medical Officers by \$157,559 and because the swing to Medicare had a large component of elective surgery in it, our Medical and Surgical supplies expenses were also exceeded by \$86,038. We do have detailed submissions before the Health Department for adjusting grants for these items which we believe are largely out of our control.

We congratulate our Administrative staff, particularly Finance Manager, Mr. Ian Barton, who has a difficult task in managing a very large budget, which is often influenced by forces beyond the control of the Hospital. The Finance Committee of the Hospital is very conscious of its responsibilities and many hours are spent in consultation with Senior staff in achieving the best out of limited resources. Both Board and Senior staff aim to be financially efficient, but it does seem that in future, in order to live within budget allocations, measures not hitherto adopted may have to be looked at. I refer here to the possibility of restricting services and establishing waiting lists in order to meet budget targets.

I also take this opportunity to thank Departmental Heads and Charge Sisters for their very fine efforts in budgetary matters.

12. STATISTICS

A table of statistics below indicates some interesting trends in the level of patient activity. For the first time in a good number of years, the number of inpatients treated exceeded 6,000. This was accompanied by a drop in the average stay per patient from 8.9 days last year to 8.2 days this year. This in turn reflects a swing to a more acute higher turnover mode of inpatient treatment, and the value of community based services referred to earlier.

The percentage occupancy of slightly less than 70% is the lowest for many years. This has led the Board and Senior staff of the Hospital to look at the rationalization of bed numbers — a subject I am sure that will receive much attention during the forthcoming year.

13. FUND RAISING

The Base Hospital's share of this years appeal was \$80,000, a figure which is arrived at by adding donations received on the day and other donations received during the appeal period.

One of the major contributors to the appeal again was the Staff Auxiliary with a magnificient donation of \$31,000, a result of its activities during the year.

We extend our thanks to the Management and Staff of 3YB and to all our individual and group donors. Particular thanks go also to staff members, Robert Moore and Bill McKinnis for their input into the appeal. Special thanks go to Tim Buckley for his many years of assistance to the Hospital in collecting donations around the Central Business District.

The Auxiliaries are very supportive of the Hospital throughout the year, both in a fund raising sense and as an important bridge between the Hospital and the community.

Board members are called upon to represent the Hospital at various community meetings and functions, attend sub-committee meetings at the Hospital and keep up with the ever increasing amount of paper work. I thank the Board Members for the support they have given to me as President during these rapidly changing times in Health Administration.

During the year, there were a number of changes on the Board of Management.

As you know, vacancies on the Board are advertised and recommendations for appointment are forwarded to the Health Department. The Minister of Health considers the applications received and the Board's recommendation and makes his recommendation to the Governor in Council.

16. REGION

The Base Hospital has continued to provide a wide range of services to District Hospitals and other Institutions in the Sub-Region. The deployment of Medical Ancillary personnel, particulary

enhances the standard of care available to elderly and disabled persons in their own town or district.

We regret that through no fault of our own, it has not been possible to satisfy all the Regions needs and this has been largely because of recruitment difficulties. It has been particularly difficult to obtain the services of Physiotherapists and Occupational Therapists during this year. However, we receive good co-operation from the Regional Institutions and we look forward to this continuing. We are working in close harmony with major institutions in the area such as Lyndoch, Brierly and Hamilton Base Hospital, in an effort to develop services, share resources and the like and we anticipate rewards in the coming year.

17. CONCLUSION

It has again been a difficult year in the area of Health Administration. We are faced with many problems, as are all Health Care Institutions. However, I believe that with the calibre of Management and staff that we have and with a determination to co-operate with our fellow workers and administrators, we will succeed in our primary objective — the effective and efficient provision of Health Care to the Community we serve.

Medical Superintendent's Report

The year 1984-85 saw many changes in the medical staff of the hospital with several resignations and many new appointments which have increased the available expertise within the hospital.

Dr. J. Brookes resigned from the staff in September, 1984, after more than 20 years of service to this hospital and the women of Warrnambool and District, as Specialist Obstetrician Gynaecologist. Joe provided a 1st class service to his patients, and there are many people in the community who owe their start in life to the skill and dedication of Dr. Brookes. He has resigned to pursue his career overseas and his absence will be noticed by everyone.

Dr. Cosmos Wong was pathologist to the hospital for three years and has resigned to pursue his career in Sydney.

Dr. Glyn Priddle, Medical Superintendent for 2 years, resigned to take up an appointment as Casualty Director at Geelong Hospital. During his stay at Warrnambool Base Hospital he was responsible for the re-organisation of many areas under his jurisdiction including the Medical staff organisation and several "paramedical" areas. This task was undertaken with singlemindedness, and the hospital will reap the benefits of his labours for years to come.

Dr. I. Carson has been appointed to replace Dr. Priddle and comes to us from Moe. Both the Acting Med Supers together with all the medical staff look forward to Dr. Carson's arrival.

Many new faces appeared on the Medical staff in 1984-85. Dr. I. Pettigrew was appointed to replace Dr. Brookes and Dr. C. Beaton was appointed to the staff in March 1985; both these doctors are Obstetricians and Gynaecologists.

Mr. S. Fischer was appointed as the third specialist Surgeon, Dr. N. Bayley was appointed as Geriatrician and then as Specialist Physician, Dr. K. Prest as a Specialist Anaesthetist and Dr. E. Pihl as the Regional Director of Pathology.

With the arrival of these specialists the range of services offered by this hospital is now commensurate with the hospital's role as a regional referral hospital.

Dr. R. Brough returned from six months leave which was spent at the Pleasant View Centre in Melbourne. During this time he studied drug and alcohol dependence and rehabilitation; some of the time being spent at Pentridge prison and the Smith Street detoxification clinic.

Although early days, the meetings have been fruitful and hopefull will restore some of the esprit-de-corps that has been lacking in hospitals for the last five or so years.

Industrial Problems:

The overall management of the nursing department was not unduly affected by the bans implemented in June 1984 or "non nursing duties".

We are most grateful to these people who gave so freely of their time, thus ensuring that the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital continued to fulfill its role to the community.

College Based Education:

That nursing education be conducted in an Institute/College Advanced Education has long been the philosophy of the nursing profession of Australia; the aims of such a move being safer and more efficient patient care.

With foresight and enthusiasm representations of the nursing department commenced 6 years ago, a discussion with the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education in an endeavour to ensure that the South West region of Victoria and South East, South-Australia retained a centre for nursing education.

Throughout the ensuing years discussions and negotiations have contined despite what seemed at times to all concerned, insurmountable odds.

Nursing representatives have been involved in discussions with among others Dr. N. Blewett, Federal Minister of Health; Senator O. Refresher Course for Registered Nurses:

The transition of nursing education into the college environment will not be without initial problems and one prophylactic measure has been to conduct Post Basic Refresher Courses for Registered Nurses.

- Ensure educational preparation of graduate nurses whose skills need updating.
- Promote more effective service to the community by the mature nurse.
- Promote the ultimate aim of high quality patient care. The first of these courses commenced on the 11th February, 1985 with 10 participants successfully completing the seven weeks programme.

Rapid advances were made of recent months towards transfer of the general nursing course to the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education. Funding is now available, the Course anticipates accreditation very soon, and 1986 should herald in general nursing originating from the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education. Throughout the planning of this move, the teachers from our School of Nursing have been involved, and are still exercised in many elements of the orderly transfer, while catering for the hospital's needs and the requirements of our current student nurses. We have attempted to keep nurses and the general public informed, particularly of the rationale for the change in the source of nurse education.

The School played the major role in a refresher course for general registered nurses in February and March of this year, which was much appreciated by its ten participants, most of whom are now employed in nursing again. A further course is planned for the last week in September and through October. Nurse teachers find this a rewarding experience with such highly motivated 'students'.

We have continued to provide supervised clinical experience for psychiatric student nurses from Brierly Hospital and they reciprocate for our students. Similar experience with supervision is also given to Ambulance Officer students.

Robert Gunter joined the School staff in August, transferring from the operating theatre staff. He is proving a value teacher. Further staff adjustments are anticipated as our student members and demands reduce in 1986 — all of which is provoking serious thought and planning.

The bulk of the screening of hearing of the mentally handicapped at the four south-western Victorian centres was done at my request by Audiologists from the Health Commission, 555 Collins Street. I can complete the initial screening and then do all the follow-up work of retesting and hearing aid fitting following medical/surgical intervention.

INFORMATION ROLE

Infant Welfare Liaison

Infant hearing screening training sessions were held at Hamilton and Mortlake. A paper was prepared on screening techniques for use there and in New Zealand.

Laryngectomees

A discussion on problems of communication was held with a group of Laryngectomees in conjunction with speech pathology.

Lectures to student nurses

Six such talks on "The Deaf Patient in Hospital" were given at Hamilton Base Hospital and Warrnambool & District Base Hosp. al.

Observers

Nurses from the Day Hospital observe Audiology delivery services one half day a week.

Community Groups

PSYCHO-ACOUSTIC ASSESSMENT FACILITY

Figure/ground and short term memory tests are procedures that have been added to the audiological battery of tests. Modifications to equipment necessary to perform these tests have been done following requests for fuller information about a child's performance under adverse noise conditions.

AUDIO-VISUAL DEPARTMENT

Demand for audio-visual programmes has been very high in the past year, with many requests for audio-tapes, overhead transparencies, slides and video-tapes.

Subjects have included Child Development, Dermatology, Diabetics, Fire/Evacuation Procedures, Infection Control, Interview Techniques, Mental Health, Obstetrics, Orthodontics, Relaxation Therapy, Social Work, Surgical Techniques, and Theatre Nursing Procedures.

The department was again involved with radio broadcasts for the 3YB Hospital Appeal.

There has also been a marked increase in the number of requests for clinical photographs, particularly in the areas of dermatology, gynaecology and pathology.

Other hospitals and health agencies requesing work have included Box Hill, Brierly, Castlemaine, Hamilton, Mortlake and Timboon Hospitals, the Southwest Ambulance Service and the Early Childhood Development Programmes.

Distribution of completed programmes contines through the excellent co-operation of the hospital Library and the Regional Medical Library Service.

DENTAL CLINIC

This year there were 5,859 attendances at the dental clinic. 443 dentures were provided and 2,715 teeth were restored.

Dr. Michael Silva is at present on 8 months unpaid leave overseas and has been replaced for this period of time by Dr. Darren Thrift a recent graduate of Melbourne University.

During the year Mrs. Gail Milne resigned and was replaced by Suzy Bathe who is a trainee dental nurse.

The Victorian Government has introduced a scheme which enables our patients who require full upper and lower dentures to have them made by a private dentist. This scheme has reduced our waiting list for full dentures from $2\frac{1}{2}$ years to approximately 1 year. Partial dentures continue to be manufactured by our own Laboratory staff.

JOHN REID LIBRARY

The John Reid Library provides a valuable reference service to the medical, nursing, allied health personnel and hospital staff of the Warrnambool & District Base Hospital. We also offer limited services to other health institutions in the area and to the general public.

Following my appointment on 6th July, 1984, an ex teacher-librarian, I quickly gained experience and thank the Library Committee, the Regional Medical Librarian and Miss Carey, Library Assistant for their assistance and guidance during this period.

Statistics kept over the year show an increase in library usage especially in requests for specific

information. Through the indexing services we have, inter-library loans and the use of MEDLINE computer searches by the Regional Medical Library Service, we have been able to successfully answer most requests.

Although circulation of journals was ceased to enable them to be available for all users in the library, we commenced a circulation of contents pages weekly, to interested people, enabling them to follow up articles of interest to them.

With the support of the Warrnambool Lions' Club a patient Reference Collection has been commenced containing books suitable for the 'non-medical' person.

A selection Sub-Committee meets once a month to select items for purchase. Anyone may suggest items to be considered for purchase.

MEDICAL RECORD DEPARTMENT

Once again the past year has seen a change in medical record staff. Miss Carolyn Jane, Regional Medical Record Administrator, resigned in February to take up a position with the Anti-Cancer Council. Miss Julie Stafford, Chief Medical Record Administrator, returned from 12 months leave of absence in April, but since resigned. During Julie's absence I was Acting Chief Medical Record Administrator. I assumed responsibility for the regional hospitals. However, following Julie's resignation, I have been appointed Chief Medical Record Administrator.

As yet, we have been unable to find a replacement for the regional position consequently services to the regional hospitals are limited but we endeavour to provide the best service possible given the shortage of staff. Each of the six hospitals continue to submit morbidity data.

The only change to departmental systems has been the installation of the I.C.L./Hospro computer System. This has enabled us to have our Patient Master Index on-line resulting in more efficient retrieval of patient information.

We continue to submit data to the Patient Reporting System, Australian Bureau of Statistics, Perinatal Data Collection Unit, and the Anti-Cancer Council.

DIETITIAN DEPARTMENT

Our Department is involved in the nutritinal care of individuals both in health and disease. Hospital inpatients on therapeutic diets are visited by a dietitian and receive dietary education. The well established out-patient department remains busy, offering instruction in therapeutic diets and general nutrition advice. Our work in the regional centres of Port Fairy, Timboon, Camperdown, Terang and Mortlake is continuing, particularly in providing an outpatient service.

The Department is involved in the nutrition education of student nurses, and was also pleased to contribute lectures to the Sisters Refresher Course.

Community nutrition education is an important facet of our work. In the past twelve months we have spoken to a broad range of public groups. This has included parents of pre-schoolers, students, athletic clubs, stroke group, and ante-natal classes. A successful diabetes symposium was held in April for diabetic children and their parents. We presented a talk on food ideas for parties and social occasions.

The Department has seen further staff changes over the past 12 months. Claire Martin resigned as Chief Dietitian in November, and Thyra Galvin commenced work in January.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY DEPARTMENT

The past year has presented many challenges for the occupational therapy department.

Following the resignation of Kathy McNamara in August 1984, the department remained without full permanent staffing until April 1985, necessitating a re-evaluation of our services. The appointment of Jody Gibbs and Sarah Scott as occupational therapist in April was welcome news.

To ensure a high standard of treatment, priority is now given to those patients requiring active rehabilitation. Unfortunately it has been necessary to discharge many of our long term maintenance patients, with referral to other community services wherever possible. Neurological, orthopaedic, rheumatology and paediatric clients make up our major caseload with 3,242 attendances for the year, including 375 regional attendances. Our domicillary role continues to be broadly utilised with 499 home visits performed by John Goodwin for the provision of aids and minor home alterations. Stress management and relaxation classes are conducted three times weekly.

The staff have made a valuable contribution to geriatric services with members on the extended care committee and regional geriatric assessment team. With increasing referrals for repetitive strain injury, we have also become more active in assessing the work environment, and consulting with industry. Diversional Therapy services within the hospital have been expanded, with the appointment of Oriel Harry, as occupational therapy aide. She replaces Mrs. Val Morrow, who left us to continue working at Corio House full time.

The splintshop has expanded its services, with consultants from R.A.L.A.C. attending monthly and Richard Ziegeler now nearing the completion of his full time study in prosthetics and orthotics. Extensions to the splintshop have been necessary to accommodate the developing services.

Special thanks is due to the other members of our rehabilitation team, who have provided invaluable support and encouragement. With the appointment of our new staff, and the real committment which exists to the sharing of skills and resources, we look forward to providing services in the coming year.

PHARMACY DEPARTMENT

Computerization has been a major area of development in the Pharmacy Department over the last year. A pharmacy system called "STOCKER" was introduced on hardware, purcahsed by administration for accounting purposes. "STOCKER" meets the needs of a base hospital pharmacy department and features:

- (i) Customer billing e.g. regional hospitals, wards, departments;
- (ii) Stock system operations, product/order enquiries; packing slip and invoice information:
- (iii) Management reports, reports by drug classification, expiry date, monthly sales summaries, outstanding order reports;
- (iv) Label and imprest list generation;
- (v) Stock take function;
- (vi) Top 40 drug expenditure items.

Mrs. June Foster has worked tirelessly on the system and must receive the credit for establishing and updating files and managing the day to day functions of the computer. Mr. W. McKinnis, Systems Officer, has also provided a lot of support in "debugging" problem areas.

It is planned to further utilise the computer facilities by linking into the National Drug Information Service in Canberra and the Medline Information Network.

Computerization has had an impact on our pharmacists involvement at the ward level. A powerful HP41CV hand held computer was purchased to optimize dosages of certain drugs from individual patient data. Ideal body weight is determined and information on renal function or drug blood levels is entered into the computer to determine the most appropriate dose for that patient. Dose optimisation implies a better use of drugs and a reduction in side effects.

Norm Ferrier spent many hours programming the system.

Other developments during the year included a re-organisation of ward pharmacy services which enabled the ward pharmacists to spend more time in the wards and in counselling patients about their medication. A study of ward pharmacy services in Warrnambool and District Base Hosital formed the project part of Section 2 of the Fellowship Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia, which Marie Luxford successfully completed.

Congratulations go to Allan Luke for successfully completing his Graduate Diploma in Hospital Pharmacy at the Victorian College of Pharmacy.

Other developments during the year included the establishment of a Total Parenteral Nutrition (T.P.N.) Committee with medical, nursing, pharmacy and dietetic representatives. All aspects of parenteral feeding were examined and guidelines established.

The workload for the preparation of anti-cancer (cytotoxic) injections increased as the trend for patients to be referred from specialist clinics for maintenance therapy continued.

Mrs. J. McKenna, Pharmacy Assistant retired after 11 years of service and her place has been capably filled by Mrs. J. Priestley.

Kerren Melgaard joined the staff as a Pharmacy Intern for 1985.

PHYSIOTHERAPY DEPARTMENT

The past year has seen relatively stable staffing levels, with only one period of understaffing following the resignations of Shirley Jenkins and Wayne Edney in October, 1984. Clare Delaney also resigned in February, 1985. Two new graduates, Sally Swan and Donna McGrath, were appointed in December, 1984, and January, 1985, respectively, whilst the position of Allied Health Assistant was not filled until Febrary, 1985, when Cherrie Anderson joined our staff. We were fortunate to regain the services of Lesley Walker, now a qualified Manipulative Therapist, on a sessional basis in March, 1985.

During the past few years a dynamic Rehabilitation Unit has been developed in place of the preexisting Day Hospital service, and whilst this has been a most welcome and exciting change, it has led to excessive workloads for physiotherapists working in this area. In order to maintain the best quality of care for patients, we have had to rationalise services by giving priority for treatment to those patients with the greatest potential for rehabilitation.

The Physiotherapy Department has continued its involvement in community services, the School of Nursing student program, and preventative health care programs throughout the hospital. We have also been involved in a pilot program for third-year physiotherapy students from Lincoln Institute, as well as the existing fourth-year programs.

Physiotherapy facilities have been updated with a small extension to the existing Rehabilitation Unit, and with the moving of the Outpatient Clinic from Timor Street into the Community Services Block. We are looking forward to the prospect of finally becoming a united department within the new building planned to house rehabilitation and paramedical services.

PODIATRY DEPARTMENT

The Base Hospital Podiatry Department has continued to grow in the last twelve months. Both staffing and services have increased, allowing the Department to reach a large number of people throughout the Corangamite Region.

In December 1984, nearing the completion of her twelve months leave of absence, Miss Elizabeth Rhook resigned from her position as Chief Podiatrist. Miss Janice Nelson was appointed to her position.

Mrs. Louise Jeffery, a Lincoln Institute Bursary Holder commenced in January, 1985 joining Miss Rebecca Simpson and Miss Janice Nelson. 20 The increase in staffing has allowed for an expansion of service. New Regional services undertaken in the last year include Port Fairy Hospital, Camperdown Hospital and Camperdown Elderly Citizens Club. Lyndoch Home and Hospital for the Aged is now serviced, by the Base Hospital Podiatrists for five sessions each week. This liason between hospitals has allowed for a much more efficient service for all patients attending our Podiatry clinics.

Inpatient and outpatient services to Timboon, Terang, Corio House and the Rehabilitation Unit continue to be busy.

A greater number of patients are presenting for orthotic therapy, allowing managment of their biomechanical and structural problems more effective.

The three Podiatrists are therfore making good use of the Rehabilitation Unit splinting department where they manufacture all the orthoses themselves.

Podiatry appointments continue to be well attended at all clinics. A total of 307 new patients registered at the Base this year and total attendances numbered 2,870.

All the regional centres, too, are busy with some 500 patients being attended by the Podiatrists on 2,382 occasions. Some 330 new patients were registered in Regional Clinics.

To keep in touch with new developments and equipment, all three Podiatrists have attended workshops, seminars and conferences. Such topics discussed at these sessions have included Biomechanics, Sports Medicine, Electrodynography, Gait Analysis and Diabetes Mellitis. A great deal is gained for the whole department from these seminars and all are very appeciative of the opportunities to attend.

SOCIAL WELFARE DEPARTMENT

The Social Welfare Department consists of one Social Worker and one Welfare Officer. The primary responsibility of the department is to offer a direct service to hospital patients and their families. The range of services includes individual counselling, group therapy, practical assistance and liaison with other agencies.

This year a total of 2,398 people have been assisted with occasions of service amounting to 4,755.

The department has continued to be involved in the Stress Management Courses, the Drink Driving Programme, and the co-ordination of Volunteers Auxiliary.

Miss Jenny Murray, who was previously head of the department, left Warrnambool in June, 1985 and is currently enjoying a holiday overseas.

Jenny was well respected for her work in the community and was the instigator of many current welfare groups in Warrnambool.

Andrew Mozina joined the department in June, 1985 in the role of Welfare Officer.

Andrew has had considerable experience working with both rehabilitation and geriatric patients in Melbourne and has already proved to be a valuable asset to the Social Welfare Department.

SPEECH PATHOLOGY

As in preceding years, the Speech Pathologists have continued to work like Trojans! However, many other things have been happening as a result of this.

In January, 1985, we farewelled Julie Brock overseas and welcomed Maria McCabe to the workforce. This meant that the contingent of three full-time therapists was maintained and consequently, regional and community services could continue efficiently.

An ongoing aim of the department has been to improve community awareness of the Speech Pathologists role. This is being achieved by our continued involvement in support groups for laryngectomees, stutterers, hearing impaired etc.

Also in the running of programmes for specific groups:

- Following the success of last years pilot project, another intensive fluency programme for stutterers was held in May, 1985.
 - Again, 6 adult stutterers were required to reach a level of fluency, which could be maintained while speaking on 3YB and being interviewedd by the Standard. Although very testing (for both therapists and clients) it was a successful and rewarding week.
- A new programme was run in January 1985 for children with multiple articulation problems who were long term patients making little progress. The programme involved intensive daily speech practice through games and excursions for a one week period and the eight children all benefited significantly.
- Follow-up work and further programmes will be interesting to determine the value and success of individual long-term therapy as opposed to intensive group therapy.

Janet Malseed attended the 1985 A.A.S.H. (Australian Association of Speech and Hearing) Conference in Melbourne and imparted information on advances in the profession to regional Speech Pathologists.

Involvement in integration of disabled children has required increasing consultative services to schools.

A dramatic increase in the number of work experience students and involvement of the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education Teacher Education Students has indicated that communication disorders are becoming more widely reconised. With the recent acquisition of video equipment in the department, it is anticipated that our continued involvement in providing these and other education services will be possible.

PATHOLOGY DEPARTMENT

Major changes have taken place during the last twelve months. The installation of the I.C.L. computer necessitated changes in the patterns of work flow, specimen handling and reporting. The changeover was generally smooth, and the new system has proved superior. Because of these changes, the workload figures can not readily be compared with those of previous years, but a small increase has occurred in most sections, and a greatly improved efficiency in the turnaround of specimens and outgoing reports.

The branch laboratory at the Camperdown hospital is continuing to work efficiently and continues to give a good service to this part of the region.


Dr. C.S. Wong left the Department in April, 1985 to take up a position as Staff Pathologist at the Sutherland Hospital in Sydney; Dr. E. Pihl succeeded him as Regional Pathologist. An agreement with the Hamilton Base Hospital led to the establishment of a Southwest Regional Service. This should enable us to achieve greater efficiency and co-ordination in the subregion.

DIVISIONAL REPORTS

Biochemistry: The past twelve months has been a time of many changes in the Biochemistry Laboratory. Approximately 85,000 tests were processed which is similar to previous years. Three new 22

analysers are now operational and these have enabled us to materially extend the range of tests, available, to shorten the turnaround time of tests, and to facilitate emergency analyses.

The introduction of the I.C.L. computer system and the changeover went smoothly and the system is now producing quick reports and easy access to previous test data.

Blood Transfusion Service: Donations rose by 66% this year to the total of 2243. The increase is due to our zealous donors in the country areas. Our thanks to donors and all involved in this vital service.

The introduction of a screening test for A.I.D.S. has removed many of the worries and doubts experienced by donors and staff alike. The tests have been performed by the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service in Melbourne. Shortly we shall be screening the donor blood ourselves, enabling us to use it with a minimal delay.

Cytology: The laboratory performed 2795 procedures relating mostly to exfoliative cytology, mainly gynaecological. There has been a steady increase especially in non-gynaecological, and aspiration cytology. Cytology reporting was computerised in April, 1985.

Microbiology: In the past twelve months the Microbiology Department performed 26,801 procedures, corresponding to a workload increase of approximately 17%. A closed blood culturing system introduced in April, 1985 enables us to detect positive blood cultures earlier than before and reduces the risk of contamination due to airborn bacteria.

Histopathology and Anatomical Pathology: The workload in this section has remained similar to that in previous years.

Haematology/Serology: New procedures introduced in the past year include immunoflourescent tests for Epstein-Barr virus, Toxoplasma gondii, and Chlamydia trachomatis. We are currently introducing test systems to enable us to screen for possible antibodies to HTLV III virus (A.I.D.S.) in blood donors, which is a very remote possibility in our population, but this is necessary in order to protect our patients.

CONCLUSION:

The last twelve months have seen major changes, most importantly in our provision of pathology services to the community. These include the extension of hours of collection services and improved courier services to the region. The turnover time of tests and reports has been substantially reduced, providing the doctors in the region with a quicker and more efficient service, which will be further improved by on line computer communications in the near future.

RADIOLOGY DEPARTMENT

This year has seen many sweeping changes in the staffing of the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital, with the recruitment of an additional surgeon, anaesthetist, physician and obstetritiongynaecologist. This has considerably increased the depth of medical skills and manpower available in the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital.

Unfortunately Dr. Ken King who was with us for 6 months returned to Ballarat to work, leaving only two radiologists supplying a regional service and with this manpower shortage we were unable to continue the service to the Hamilton Base Hospital. Continuing the service to Portland also placed considerable demands on the radiologists' time and once again we began the search for a third radiologist.

After considerable time and advertising in Australia, New Zealand, United Kindom and Canada, we have eventually been successful in attracting a further radiologist, Dr. Clive Perry, who will join us as an assistant with a view, in August 1985. This will enable the radiologists to continue serving the Portland Hospital, which remains the only significant centre from which we are receiving regional referrals.

With the experience of our previous attempt at supplying a fully regional service we are now aware that it would require at least four radiologists to cope with the total regional workload, if it included Camperdown and Hamilton.

The full approval and funding of a C.T. Scanner for the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital is very near to completion at this stage, and the

installation of this equipment will now almost certainly take place in the 1985-86 year. This should make a considerable impact on the workload of the radiology department and will almost certainly significantly reverse the trend for patients to leave town in order to have scanning services carried out in major centres.

Re-organization of the Health Commission resulting in regional administration may well result in some clearly defined plan for expansion of medical services at the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital, and certainly will result in some further enhancement of the status of the hospital as a regional referral centre. The presence of a C.T. Scanning service in the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital is an important link in the chain of development of the hospital as a regional referral centre.

We were again fortunate to maintain a stable staff situation during the year, with no staff resignations. We have had Terry Sketcher, a final year radiography student with us for most of the year, and a locum radiographer Caroline Erskine from the U.K., was the other non-permanent staff member working in the department during this last 12 months.

Our popular male radiographer Luke Pontonio became engaged to Christine McDonald one of our receptionists in April 1985 and we wish them well for the future after their marriage scheduled for September 1985.

With our expanded radiology staff the department as a whole looks forward to a very interesting period, the highlight of which will be the installation of the C.T. Scanner in late 1985 or early 1986.

REHABILITATION UNIT

The rehabilitation unit operates as a multidisciplinary team with the aim of restoring function to the disabled where possible, and minimising disability where present. Participants in the team approach include nursing staff with particular skills and interest in rehabilitation, a physician, social workers, podiatrists, occupational therapists, physiotherapists, speech therapists and splintmakers.

The rehabilitation team has a committment to service both the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital and community, and to provide a regional service to outlying centres including Terang, Timboon, Mortlake, Camperdown and Port Fairy.

Total attendance to the department for all disciplines 1984-85 were 12,751 and regional attendances totalled 3,528. There has been a progressive rise in the workload presented to the department in recent years, totalling 60% increased attendance over five years. Concurrently, there has been a change in emphasis from maintenance activities typical of a day hospital to active rehabilitation following acute illness. There has not been a corresponding rise in staff levels, and the consequence has been a significant increase in the work loads of staff members.

As a consequence, a policy of restricting the availability of long-term maintenance therapy has had to be adopted so that more pressing acute needs can be serviced.

Staffing has in general been maintained at establishment level, individual staff changes are largely chronicled in the respective departmental reports. Dr. Noel Bayley commenced in February as consultant geriatrician, and will continue in that role on a sessional basis. Miss Sandra Allsopp was promoted to chief social worker and Mr. Andrew Mozina has taken up the post of welfare officer to the rehabilitation department.

The department continues to have a strong interest in community care, and community health education. A variety of educational meetings have been arranged for both lay and professional personnel. Members of the department participate in the recently formed regional assessment team, which is central to the provision of appropriate care for the elderly and disabled.

The department is at present housed in elderly buildings ill adapted to their current use. We look forward eagerly to the proposed new rehabilitation building development.


