128th Annual Report

TO THE LIFE GOVERNORS AND CONTRIBUTORS

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is my privilege to present the 128th Annual Report of the Warrnambool and District Base Hospital and Corio House Nursing Home Annexe for the period 1st July, 1981 to 30th June, 1982, and for Alveston House Nursing Home Annexe from 1st July, 1981, until it closed in February, 1982.

In common with the climate of recent years, management of our financial resources has been a major aspect of Board of Management responsibilities during the 1981/82 financial period. Careful control of the operating fund budget by departmental officers has resulted in the hospital functioning within its expenditure allocation of \$10,819,049. As is the situation with many other hospitals in the state, there is a cash deficit at this hospital of \$151,286 at 30th June, 1982. In an attempt to reduce these deficits, free treatment has been restricted, commencing September of last year, to pensioners and persons with low income in

possession of entitlement cards, all others have been required to pay fees. On 1st July, 1982, all fees increased dramatically and in addition, a special levy, paid direct to the State Treasury by health insurance funds, is to help finance the cost of maintaining outpatient services at public hospitals. Apart from the cost of drugs and certain aids and appliances, registered outpatients who are insured will not be required to pay a fee to the hospital when attending for treatment.

BUILDING AND PLANT

Arrangements have been made with the Health Commission to install new steam raising plant on the basis of the hospital providing the necessary finance initially, subsidy to be paid in future years when government funds become available. A similar arrangement was made to build the new kitchen. The replacement boilers are to be installed in a new building to be erected on the south west corner of the hospital block. Cost of the scheme is estimated to be between \$700,000 and \$800,000.

Government grant of \$127,250 was received under the minor works programme which with a contribution from committee funds made it possible to complete the following works and projects:

A rental arrangement was finalised with Telecom Australia for the installation of a Philips D1202 Stored Program P.A.B.X.. The new unit has been operational since April, 1982, and the many automatic features are providing a much improved telephone service.

Earlier in the year, a block of six flats, quite close to the hospital in Timor Street, was purchased for \$165,000. The hospital now owns twelve flats within easy walking distance to accommodate the twelve resident medical officers. The cost will be recouped from rents received. There has been no further progress with the plan to replace the remaining old buildings on the hospital site other than the writing of a new functional brief for the Health Commission Hospitals Development Team.

At Corio, a significant extension to the sunroom has been made. W.J. & C.F. Dart, builders of Allansford are carrying out the work at a contract price of \$46,863.







STATISTICS

For a number of years, it has been policy to develop and expand the Domiciliary Nursing Service and the Day Hospital to the extent that funds and staff allocations will permit. By providing this type of care, admission to hospital for expensive inpatient treatment is avoided for many patients. The Board is sensitive to the never ending increase in health care costs and is conscious at all times of its responsibility to conduct the hospital as economically as possible. A table of figures published by the Health Commission for the 1980/81 financial year, placed Warrnambool as having the lowest cost per patient day of all Base Hospitals in the State. This is a positive indication that our management methods are effective. Costs ranged from \$128.45 per patient day to \$192.90 per patient day.

ALVESTON HOUSE

As a result of the completion of the new fifty bed nursing home unit at Lyndoch, the Health Commission directed that the thirty-three patients at Alveston and the staff be transferred to Lyndoch. This transfer took place during February of this year, leaving the Alveston building vacant.

In consultation with Brierly Hospital, it has been decided to transfer the Psychiatric Community Clinic from Ryot Street to Alveston. A request from the Francis Foundation to allow the Reverend John Grace to conduct a Christian Community House in the remaining sections of the building has received favourable consideration by the Board. The scheme is subject to the approval of the Health Commission, which at the time of writing this report, has not yet been received.

STAFF

For a variety of reasons there have been several changes in senior staff positions which fortunately have been achieved without disrupting the patient care programme.

Doctor John O'Callaghan was appointed full time Medical Superintendent for a four year term commencing 1st February, 1982. Prior to this Doctor O'Callaghan, with the assistance of Doctor Hemingway, attended to the duties of Medical Superintendent in a part time capacity for a considerable period. The sincere appreciation of the Board is extended to these two doctors for their conscientious and efficient administrative work until a full time appointment became possible.

Doctor Kempler, Specialist Pathologist, resigned at the beginning of 1982 and Doctor Wong of Sydney was appointed to replace him.

Regretfully the Director of Nursing, Miss Stewart, commenced an extended period of sick leave during June of this year. Miss Taylor, her deputy, has accepted the position of Acting Director of Nursing with Miss Edgar as Acting Deputy Director of Nursing. The Board is grateful to these two nursing officers for accepting these positions.

Mrs. Bruce, the Director of Nursing at Alveston for many years, retired from active nursing duty at the time her patients were transferred to Lyndoch. She is to be commended for her loyal and dedicated service in caring for the aged over a long period and we wish her many happy years of retirement.

The position of Specialist Anaesthetist and Director Intensive Care has not yet been filled on a permanent basis. Our thanks is due to the General Practitioners who are maintaining the service and to the Locum Tenens Specialists who have assisted from time to time.

Fortunately other key positions have remained stable and the opportunity is taken to commend the following heads of service departments for another year of loyal and dedicated effort:





Staff members in all departments are encouraged to keep themselves up to date with the latest methods and procedures in their particular field of endeavour, and also to maintain close contact with their professional organizations. It was possible to allow an adequate budget for this activity and many staff members pursued an active continuing education programme.

NURSE TRAINING

A joint working party comprising representatives of the Hospital School of Nursing and the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education have been studying the practicalities of developing a College based Nursing Education Course at Warrnambool. The proposal has reached the stage where the Institute has engaged an experienced nurse educator to design a course which will be submitted to the Victorian Post Secondary Education Commission and its Accreditation Board for approval.

FUND RAISING

Capital and minor works programs continue to be funded by the Government on the basis of a contribution by the local community. To provide these funds, the usual appeal for charitable contributions was conducted throughout the year, culminating with the 3YB Radio Appeal on Sunday, June 20th, 1982. Total donations to all hospitals participating in the appeal amounted to \$170,875. Our share of this total was:

The usual Miss, Mr. or Ms. Hospital competition was again a feature of the appeal and we thank Miss Glenda Sim and Mr. Trevor McKenzie of the Base Hospital staff and Miss Pam McLeod of Corio House staff

for acting as our candidates in this competition. Although neither of our entries was successful in winning, their combined efforts benefited our funds by:

The total contribution from their fund raising efforts throughout the year was \$36,880.64, which indicates the extent of their activities.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Two members of long standing, Mr. J. C. Rule and Mr. D. M. Dickson, completed their most recent three year term of office on 27th September, 1981 and declined reappointment. Mr. Dickson was originally elected in 1948 and served continuously for a period of thirty three years. Mr. Rule was elected in 1957 and served continuously for a period of twenty four years. On behalf of all members of the Board, Contributors, Staff and the Community generally, I commend these two gentlemen for their long and distinguished service and thank them for their contribution to Hospital Management.

CONCLUSION


The method of funding, and delivery of hospital and health services, continues to be debated at length by the opposing political parties. At the moment we have the "user pays" philosophy which places the responsibility on the hospital to collect a greater proportion of its income direct from patients. The proponents of this philosophy maintain that such a system reduces the incidence of over use of services and so in the end result, costs will be less. Statistics listed earlier in this report for 1981/82 show a decline in the number of persons admitted for treatment as

inpatients and a similar decline in outpatient attendances. This is an indication that payment of a fee at the point of service, does in fact have the effect of reducing demand to some extent.

In view of the frequent changes in funding methods, the hospital continues to function efficiently and effectively on a day by day basis. Community involvement is being maintained and I wish to thank the many organisations and individuals who assist in a voluntary capacity. I also express appreciation to His Worship The Mayor, Councillor John Lindsay and Shire President, Councillor Allan Warburton for their interest in hospital affairs, and their willingness to attend hospital functions when requested to do so.

In conclusion, I acknowledge the work of the Chief Executive Officer, Mr. A. Matthews and his Deputy, Mr. W. P. Vaughan in attending to the general administration of the hospital in a capable manner.

The District Nursing Service has also experienced an interesting and busy year with a wide variety of activities and patients (youngest aged 2, oldest 100 years).

As a committee member and Victorian State Representative of the Australian Council of Community Nursing (Victorian State Branch) Mrs. M. Stuchbery, Assistant Supervisor, District Nursing Service, has been active in attending meetings and Study Days.

Miss Pauline Nicolson has travelled widely within the district with the Anti Cancer Council Breast Prosthesis Kit including district hospitals in Portland, Cobden, Koroit, Terang and St. John of God and Lyndoch in Warrnambool.

Home visits have also been included on Miss Nicolson's travelling itinerary and have proved most beneficial to all involved.

Mrs. Maureen Stevens, Stomal Therapist, has also provided a much needed service to most parts of the region including Terang, Timboon and Heywood.

In November 1981 a Diabetic Advisory Service was commenced to provide education and advice to diabetics and the community. Mrs. Lois Mapleson and subsequently Mrs. Barbara King have provided a valuable service to 35 people in the seven month period. The service entails visits to district hospitals, regular Wednesday clinics in the Community Services Block at the Base Hospital and home visits. This service is an adjunct to that provided by Miss N. Foran and her staff in Medical Ward.

Throughout the year the Nursing Practice Committee has continued to pursue its aims of maintaining and improving the standard of nursing care by evaluating, reviewing and updating nursing methods and investigating all incidents relating to errors in nursing practice. In an attempt to more fully develop its research objective the Committee has conducted surveys on the management of pressure areas and the effectiveness of various pressure care aids. A re-evaluation and upgrading of catheter management regimes has also resulted from a survey conducted. A more systematic approach to incident investigation and compilation of statistics is being instituted. Maintenance of safety standards in nursing practice has been a priority of the committee throughout the year; changes in charting procedures have been made while two instructional audio-visual slide presentations were completed to educate staff in the use of new equipment. In the developmental stages is the drafting of criteria for a Nursing Audit program which will provide a formal evaluation process for assessing nursing care. Nursing Audit will be used in conjunction with the patient service questionnaires compiled and distributed earlier this year.

In May this year an appraisal of the Nursing Department establishment was required resulting in a reduction of 8.01 staff. In addition, the difficulties encountered as a result of Methycillin Resistant Staph. Aureus plus the increasing complexities of the specialist areas have contributed to a challenging year indeed.

During the past year the staff of the School of Nursing have continued to face the challenges of teaching to assist students to acquire the knowledge and skills necessary to attain and maintain a high quality of care for their patients. The requirements of the curriculum for hospital-based nurse training requires student nurses to obtain more 'scrubs' during their Operating Theatre experience; all other aspects of the programme for both General and State Enrolled Nurses were commended by the Victorian Nursing Council following a recent inspection.

The teachers recognize the importance of the experimental component of the curriculum and appreciate the co-operation of all Registered Nurses and other personnel in the wards, departments and other health agencies who contribute towards making the experience meaningful for the students.

The School has participated in providing supervised clinical experience for Ambulance Officers undertaking a component of their course at this hospital and for student Psychiatric Nurses from Brierly Hospital who undertake three months clinical experience in general nursing as part of their course.

Mrs. Evelyn Smith, until recently a member of the teaching staff, has assisted the School by providing a series of lectures on Intensive Care Nursing for Registered Nurses in the Portland District. The success of this venture is evidenced by the attendance record of 40-65 participants.

Teachers have also participated in the initiation and production of audio-visual material. One video entitled 'Old Age' is completed and several more are in various stages of completion. We are appreciative of the assistance and patience afforded us by Robert Moore, Audio-Visual Technician in these ventures.

It was with regret that resignations were received from Mrs. J. Stocks, Clinical Instructor, and Mrs. M. Meek, Nurse Teacher during the past year and we wish them well for their future. We were fortunate to welcome to the staff Mrs. J. Rea, Clinical Instructor and Miss B. Stanhope who has commenced as Nurse Teacher.

APPRECIATION

Visitors to the Nursing Department have again been numerous over the year; we particularly look forward to our 'regulars' the pre school children from district kindergartens. In this regard an expression of appreciation must be extended to Miss Yvonne Teale for her willing and thoughtful arrangements for these visits.


To the bands of volunteers who comprise the Hospital Auxillaries, a special thank you for continuing to demonstrate support to the Nursing Department in so many ways.

Medical Superintendent's Report

The last year has been one of steady progress and consolidation.

Visiting Medical Staff

The Visiting Medical Staff has again remained stable. Dr. Gerald Irvine commenced duty as a General Practitioner/Visiting Medical Officer, in April. Dr. Stanley Stevens returned in midyear from six months hospital work and study in the United Kingdom.

The post of Director of Anaesthesia and Intensive Care remains unfilled. Doctors Marta Clark, Michael Power, Richard King and James Cowling all assisted capably as locums during the year.

Resident Medical Staff

The Resident Medical Staff, currently comprising six Junior Resident Medical Officers and six Interns, has worked effectively during the year.

Two Aboriginal Liaison Officers, Mrs. Bernice Morgan (Warrnambool area) and Mrs. Thelma Rose (Portland/Heywood area)

commenced full time duty attached to this hospital.

A Grief Counselling Service was established during the year and is assisting appropriate patients and their families.

A Drink-Driving course as outlined elsewhere is also functioning well.

The Audiology and Audiovisual Departments have been relocated to larger and better equipped areas. It is hoped that the Dental department, which is cramped and poorly ventilated, will also be relocated during the coming year.

Two senior medical students from the London Hospital, Mr. A. Taylor and Mr. D. Ebbs, spent two months here last August and September on elective studies. Another student from the London Hospital is expected in November.

We await the coming accreditation survey of the hospital in October with confidence.

Thanks are due to Dr. L. Hemingway, who relieved me last year when I was on extended sick leave. The Director of Nursing, Miss J. Stewart, Acting Director of Nursing, Miss K. Taylor and Chief Executive Officer, Mr. A. Matthews, have also at all times been most helpful and co-operative as have the members of the Board of Management.

AUDIO-VISUAL DEPARTMENT

Relocation of the department within the ancillary services cottage has allowed a small studio to be established, as well as separate editing and production rooms. The increased space has also allowed a more flexible equipment layout.

Several projects have been completed, the topics including infant nutrition, patient transport, infusion equipment, and old age. These programmes have been placed with the Regional Medical Library Service for distribution to other hospitals and health agencies in the state. The RMLS also acts as a central point for requests regarding future productions; a wide range of material has been requested, particularly in the areas of nurse training and community health.

Clinical and specimen photography has shown a further increase from the previous year, and several visual aids are in production, including object recognition prints for the Speech Pathology department. There has

been a steady demand for slides to illustrate lectures, and several of these will be developed further for distribution as complete programmes.

Projects in production include wound dressing techniques, kidney dialysis, and suture insertion and removal. Several hospital staff provide frequent assistance with various aspects of each production, and this help is greatly appreciated.

A film to videotape transfer system has been built, as an initial step towards a full videotape facility. Increased use of video will permit better cost containment, and allow a broader range of work to be undertaken.

DENTAL CLINIC

The Dental Clinic is staffed by two Dentists, three Nurses, one Dental Technician and two apprentice Dental Technicians.

During the year Mrs. Jane Hales left the nursing staff and was replaced by Miss Michelle Greene who will do the Australian Dental Association correspondence course.

A weekly Dental service is provided to Timboon and a fortnightly service to Brierly Hospital.

There were 6781 attendances to the Clinic during the year.

Two thousand five hundred and thirty four teeth were restored and 523 dentures were provided.

DIETETIC DEPARTMENT

The dietetic department still continues to function with Claire Martin and Catherine Hannan as Dietitians.

The work involves work with both inpatients and outpatients at the hospital and with regional hospitals as well as the supervision of diet kitchen special diets, including those for meals on wheels.

Involvement within the community is encouraged and this includes speaking to groups such as school groups, sporting groups, parents groups, weight watching groups, and others. More involvement to do with groups functioning within the hospital such as cardiac rehabilitation and antenatal groups.

This past year has seen a much greater involvement with lectures to nurses — both basic nutrition and diet therapy.

In the past year we have also tried two group education programmes — one for children teaching basics of good nutrition and the other a behaviour modification programme aimed at overweight women. It is to be hoped that these programmes were of some benefit to the participants.

LIBRARY

MEDICAL RECORDS DEPARTMENT

The Medical Record Department has again had a very busy year. We still operate on the Patient Reporting System which involves transmitting data to the Health Computing Services in Melbourne five days a week.

Diagnostic details entered into this system provide us with statistical data concerning the types of diseases treated at this hospital and also allows for information to be passed on to the Australian Bureau of Statistics so that morbidity and mortality figures can be produced.

We are also still processing work five days a week through the Computer Centre at the Warrnambool Institute of Advanced Education (W.I.A.E.). This system is our Patient Master Index which has at present in excess of 78,000 individual patients registered.

The Medical Record Committee has now become firmly established as a means of implementing changes that not only affect our department but other sections of the hospital. This committee meets quarterly and has been responsible for the introduction of new forms, policies and changes in procedure. Its value has also been proven as a means of increased inter-hospital communication.

A new label printer has been purchased to replace the existing machine which was prone to frequent mechanical problems. A much needed electric typewriter has also been acquired from another department.

Thanks must go to Dr. O'Callaghan and my staff for their efforts and support in the last twelve months.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY DEPARTMENT

Of all areas in the hospital this department, in conjunction with the rest of the Day Hospital, continues to be the most innovative and lively.

It is geared to offer a very wide range of services to a wide range of people in a big region.

Offering the usual inpatient and outpatient rehabilitation, maintenance and diversional services to the immediate area and region, its resources are increasingly being used to provide far more comprehensive services as well.

This year has also seen several satisfying discussions between this department and others particularly nursing, in order to upgrade the system of referral, assessment and appropriate ward placement of rehabilitation patients.

Consequently the Day Hospital as a whole is increasingly being regarded as what it is best equipped to be: A full rehabilitiation area as opposed to a purely geriatric department

In order to help clarify the Occupational Therapy Department's position in the hospital and inform the public about what we offer, a comprehensive list of the various tasks and services undertaken, accompany this report.

Inpatient and Outpatient Rehabilitation, Maintenance and Diversion:

As candidates are referred from the wards and Visiting Medical Officers, the therapists assess each one on an individual basis to determine:

(a) Where the patient's problems lie.

(b) Whether and how best we can help answer the problems.

The patient can then have a treatment regime organized and be seen as many times as necessary, until objectives have been met. Patients can be seen up to twice daily if needed although visits by regional cases are often restricted by transport problems.

The following types of problems are the most common:

 decreased muscle strength (in one or more muscle groups).

Abnormal muscle tone.

- Inability to perform activities of daily living, e.g. dressing, bathing, eating, budgetting, cooking, etc.
- Abnormal behavioural problems especially in children who may have emotional or intellectual problems.
 Abnormal physical or mental develop-

ment, again usually in children.

Abnormal neurological signs e.g. following C.V.A. (stroke) or effects of alcohol consumption.

Respiratory problems affecting ability to

live independently.

— Orthopaedic abnormalities following trauma (e.g. M.C.A.'s).

Regional Inpatient and Outpatient Services:

The services offered by the department at the Base Hospital are also taken to the region if necessary.

At present therapists and assistant staff travel to Camperdown and Terang on a weekly basis, visiting Merindah Lodge, Camperdown Hospital, Terang Hospital and Terang Day Hospital.

Staff will also visit Timboon, Port Fairy, Koroit, Mortlake, Cobden and Portland Hospitals when called upon.

This department has trained assistant staff for Timboon, Mortlake and Terang Hospitals and we currently supply Mortlake, Terang and Camperdown with materials and equipment for their programmes.

Domiciliary Services:

A unique, money-saving and valuable ser-

vice is provided wherein the Occupational Therapists and assistant staff themselves actually visit patient's homes anywhere in the region to assess the domestic situation and execute small alterations. Other hospitals have to employ part-time handymen and outside tradesmen to carry out this work, after occasionally more than one visit by their Occupational Therapists to assess initially and then check that the work is satisfactory.

Where major works are required, we are able to visit to assess the needs, liaise with local tradesmen to arrange quotes then supervise the suitability of the work. A large part of this involvement deals with organizing the finance from the hospital Government bodies (e.g. Repatriation Department, P.A.D.P., Social Welfare Department and the patient's family).

Up to eight, and no less than three of these visits have been done every week of this past year.

Consultation with Schools, Business Concerns and Local Government Facilities Used by Disabled People:

Any group in our region can contact this department to receive practical help or advice in the adaptation of their activities to enable involvement in them by disabled people.

During this past year we have visited schools, factories, motels and shops to advise on removal of architectural barriers, alter equipment, advise on purchase of equipment, advise on employment of disabled people and consult with management on special needs of disabled employees. Our help has been sought by Lyndoch and Brierly also.

Special Needs Group:

We continue to be involved with these groups some of which are run in the hospital and others, in the community.

Relaxation and cardiac rehabilitation, Ladies Socialization Groups, Support Group for the Handicapped, Headway (a self help group for families of head injury people), Epileptic foundation, Health Education Committee and International Year for Disabled (Warrnambool Branch) comprise the list of such special groups. Many of these, personnel in this department, have actually established such groups.

We are always available to give ongoing assistance to these and other community* projects where elderly or disabled people are involved.

Aids Provision:

This department is, unlike many, able to manufacture the larger proportion of aids re-

quired by its patients and patients in the region. Hand in hand with this responsibility goes the need for repair and maintenance of such aids. Many of these items are finished within the week they are ordered if not on the same day, at very small cost.

A large stock of commercial aids is also kept and items from the stock are issued upon assessment of patient's needs by a therapist. All aids are available as well to hospitals in other regional centres.

Wheelchair Service:

This department received much demand to assess patients for organise, purchase and finance of and teach the use of wheelchairs.

Every patient in receipt of a wheelchair requires a home visit to ensure that the chair can be used at home with no architectural barriers.

Staff in the department also service and repair such chairs being the only suitable people in the area to carry out such work. Modifications to, and additions of extras to chairs are also devised and carried out here.

This particular service was established because many of the chairs purchased to enable patients to be discharged eventually become the property of the hospital.

N.B. This department also is involved in the hire and loan of such aids and equipment to patients requiring only short term use.

Prosthetics and Orthotics:

Besides a large range of commercially acquired splints and orthoses, this department manufactures and repairs all orthotic requirements for the region.

We are able to devise new splints for specific problems, manufacture special aids for ward use (e.g. restrainer belts and bed furniture) and modify existing footwear and splints as required. Again much of this work is completed within the week of its order.

The list includes:

Hand Splints — resting splints;

- burns splints;
- renal splints, etc.

Calipers — double irons;

- toe raising springs
- full length with or without
- knee joints etc.

Insoles - Footwear - Build ups;

- Thomas heels;
- caliper ferrules
- heel pads, etc.

This section of the department also assesses for, devises and manufactures interim and definite prostheses for lower extremity amputees.

The majority of these patients have undergone amputation of one or both lower limbs following circulatory disorders. Their treatment is closely monitored by both Occupational Therapists and Physiotherapists involved in this part of the programme and their complete rehabilitation occurs here in Warrnambool in the one building. This easily solves all the problems of travelling cost to the patient, cost to the hospital, admission to city hospitals, etc., that seem to arise when patients had to rely on the old system wherein all limbs were made by the Royal Artificial Limb and Appliance Centre.

Miscellaneous Services:

Personnel from this department are involved within the hospital on Safety Committee, Fire Officers Committee, Staff Uniforms Sub Committee, lecturing to Nurses, Intern orientation, public speaking (to service clubs, etc.), Clinical Education for Lincoln Institute (we receive students on clinical application for up to eight weeks at a time) and family education (for relatives of patients). We helped establish and stock the hospital's child minding centre and are sometimes required to develop special treatment programmes for specific diagnostic groups (e.g. Anorexia Nervosa Programme, Rheumatoid Arthritis Education Clinic.)

Conclusions:

Obviously the scope of this department is broad. We cover a wide range of needs and a

big region. A lot what we do is not done elsewhere, much to the credit of the hospital.

What is often not understood by others is that the greater part of our work is carried on a one to one basis and much of the work with each patient is very time consuming.

Staff:

During 1981-82 we employed a new therapist, Miss K. McNamara to replace Miss Sarah Scott and Kathy has settled in very well

Two first year Occupational Therapy students from Lincoln Institute joined us in May for four weeks as a part of their training.

Staff attended several seminars in Melbourne in order to bring themselves up to date with new developments in various fields. Such seminars included: A new thermoplastic splinting material study day at Lincoln Institute. A seminar to discuss and investigate foundation of a self help group for relatives of head injury people. Two visits to several hospitals running cardiac rehabilitation programmes. A Health Commission Seminar on Developments in the Programme of Aids for the Disabled Scheme.

Overall it has been a year of dramatic development and growth of demand upon the department. Hopefully the economic atmosphere will allow us to meet the demands in the future.

PHARMACY DEPARTMENT

During 1982 extensive alterations were made to the ground floor section of the Pharmacy Department. Expansion and changes in the department's role since its original design meant some areas of the pharmacy were overcrowded while others were under utilized.

The main aim in redesigning the department was to create an open planned pharmacy which improved work flow and gave flexibility for future changes. Other requirements were to upgrade the security alarm system, install adjustable shelving and create office areas within the pharmacy for drug information, accounts and the Chief Pharmacist. The initial planning proceeded quickly and after delays in approval for funds, work began in December.

During the next seven months a total dislocation of the department took place. The effective working area was halved and the manufacturing section had to be transferred to the basement.

All pharmacy staff must be commended for maintaining their high work standard and cheerfulness under the trying and cramped conditions which persisted until June, 1982. Our thanks are extended to the engineer, Leo Ryan, and his team for their high standard of workman-ship in shaping the new pharmacy.

As Leon Thomas departed for Queensland Allan Luke returned from overseas to resume his previous position on the staff. We are pleased to have such a willing worker back on the team.

Equipment purchased in the last year consisted of a microfiche reader for use with the Poisons Register and Poisindex Patient Management Profiles and a polarized light viewer to detect particles in intravenous fluids.

Mrs. Mary Lou Kay attended an information conference in Canberra on Parenteral nutrition during November. Mr. Ferrier has continued his good work in the areas of drug information and ward pharmacy. Mrs. Foster is to be commended on her meticulous accounts and stock control work while Mrs. McKenna has continue capably in the busy antiseptic preparation area.

PHYSIOTHERAPY DEPARTMENT

At present the Physiotherapy Department is going through a phase of evaluation of its organisation and functions, both within the hospital and the wider community. This is primarily due to several staff changes that

have occurred during the past few months, the most significant of these being the resignation of Tony Grace after five years' service to the hospital as Chief Physiotherapist. We are sorry to lose Tony, who is an expert in his field, and we wish him well in his private practice.

Since Tony's resignation, I have filled the position of Acting Chief Physiotherapist, and will continue to do so until a permanent appointment is made. The Outpatient Department in Timor Street is operating under the umbrella of the hospital's outpatient services upon referral from a doctor, and is now serviced by only one physiotherapist, who also provides a regional physiotherapy service to Port Fairy and Koroit three mornings per week. During this transitional period, Anna Kennedy has been as invaluable as ever in assisting far beyond the call of her clerical and accounting duties.

In January this year, Marie Maguire left Warrnambool to travel overseas and has been ably replaced by Clare Cooney. Mary Page and Karen Wilde also resigned in January, but, following Jan McFarlane's resignation in May, have both rejoined the staff to co-ordinate ante and post natal classes until a permanent part time appointment is made.

The inpatient Physiotherapist and the two Physiotherapists in the Day Hospital continue to have very full workloads, and efforts are being made in these areas in particular, to improve liaison with staff and medical officers in order to better co-ordinate overall patient management.

The Day Hospital Physiotherapy Department provides a service not only to the Rehabilitation Ward and the Geriatric Ward, but also to appropriate patients in acute parts of the hospital, and to many outpatients of all ages throughout the Corangamite Region. Apart from individual treatments, activities of the Department include hydrotherapy sessions, asthma classes, yoga/relaxation classes and a cardiac rehabilitation programme.

Due to the establishment of a Day Hospital at Terang this year, the regional physiotherapist is now kept extremely busy providing a regional physiotherapy service to both the Terang Hospital and the Terang Day Hospital, as well as May Noonan House (Terang), Camperdown and Timboon Hospitals, Timboon Community Centre, Merindah Lodge (Camperdown), Sunnyside (Cobden).

As in previous years, the Physiotherapy staff have been involved in the training of final year Physiotherapy students from the Lincoln Institute of Health Sciences; six students successfully completed one month placements at the Hospital this year. We have also been involved in nursing staff training programmes at the hospital by conducting regular lectures and demonstrations, and by having trained nurses observing work in the the Day Hospital Physiotherapy Department for one week of their community block. In the wider community, staff members have been involved in sports medicine programmes, the Warrnambool Health Education Committee, and occasional presentation of talks to community groups.

The present staff have been very keen to keep abreast of new developments in their field, and all have attended at least one seminar or course during the past twelve months. These have been most beneficial to the department as a whole, and we thank the Management for the opportunity to participate in such continuing education.

I would sincerely like to thank all members of staff for their efforts during the past year, and particularly for their support and assistance to me in my role as Acting Chief Physiotherapist.

PODIATRIST DEPARTMENT

Since my appointment as full-time Podiatrist in January 1981 there has been a growing demand for Podiatry services both from inpatients and eligible outpatients from the community.

During this 18 month period, various new programmes have been established: An appliance/splinting session has been added to the week's agenda, and Diabetic Consultations in co-ordination with the wards and the Diabetic Clinic. In addition to these programs during my four days a week in the Day Hospital I spend one day at the Timboon Community Health Centre, and one day per month treating Brierly patients.

From time to time the Department is visited by Miss Janice Nelson who is the next Podiatry Bursary holder. Janice will be joining us in 1983 after the completion of her course. There has also just recently been a third Podiatry Bursary awarded to a first year Podiatry student. As such, the hospital is ensured of a Podiatry service for many years to come.

SOCIAL WELFARE DEPARTMENT

This year has been the introduction of two new services, with the assistance of community resources. These are the Grief Support Service and Drink-Drivers' Courses.

The Grief Support Service commenced in February, 1982 with counsellors being involved in working with terminally ill patients, their relatives, and other persons experiencing grief, but not necessarily associated with terminal illness. Two community workers specializing in this area are assisting with the service. The long term goal is for the establishment of a Palliative Care Unit in the hospital in the future.

The first Drink-Drivers' course commenced in April, 1982, being co-ordinated by Marcelle Holdaway, Health Promotions Officer at the Early Childhood Development Programme, and myself. The aim of the course is to help young drivers understand the risks involved in excessive drinking, especially when combined with driving. The course consists of 4 x 2 hour sessions held over four weeks, and includes drivers who have been convicted of drink-driving with a blood alcohol reading of .1% or greater and who are under 26 years of age. Responses from participants indicates that the course is proving worthwhile. Dr. Roger Brough and Sergeant Glen Riddell provide regular input into the course and thanks are extended to them for their services. Appreciation is also extended to Mr. Jim Hanrahan, S.M., Superintendent Carey, Clerk of Courts, Alcoholics Anonymous, and

Management and staff for their support in the planning and continuity of the course.

The Child Minding Centre is now being coordinated by Mr. Joe Rhoddy, a retired school teacher and volunteer minder since the centre began two years ago. With Mr. Roddy's experience and enthusiasm, the centre is able to continue to provide a valuable service to the hospital. We thank Mr. Rhoddy and the volunteer minders for their services in minding a total of 783 children in the past twelve months.

The Department continues to be involved in Yoga and Relaxation Classes, Ante-natal sessions and Cardiac Rehabilitation, as well as providing input to Community groups. Lectures to student nurses and Community Organizations continues.

Although much time has been spent establishing the Grief Support Service and Drink-Drivers' programme, a total or 1,050 persons have been assisted by the department, with occasions of service totalling 3,966.

Mrs. Robbie Taylor continues to provide her invaluable experience and wonderful support.

SPEECH PATHOLOGY DEPARTMENT

The Speech Pathology Department continues to be staffed by 3 full-time Speech Pathologists. Miss Julie Brock joined the staff in March 1982, replacing Miss Pauline Mendes who is now travelling overseas.

The Department has expanded its services to include a number of regional centres. Services cover: Port Fairy Hospital — half day per week, Terang Day Hospital — half day per week and Timboon Community Health Centre — one day per week. The Department also serves the Day Training Centres in the region — Yalundah and Cooinda — for half day each per week. Staff see a number of students individually, while working with the teachers on a consultative basis.

One staff member now participates in an "Early Intervention Program" that was set up in November 1981 by Dr. N. Thies. Developmentally delayed children are seen at an early age by a team consisting of: Paediatrician, Occupational Therapist, Speech Pathologist, Physiotherapist, Psychologist and Pre-School Teacher. The children are seen individually as well as in a group setting. Parent education is a large part of the program.



Radiology Report

The highlight of this period was the installation of the C.G.R. Prestalix Angio. Remote Control X-Ray machine and its ancillary equipment. The installation commenced on 19th October, 1981 and it was fully installed and operational by 10th December, 1981. Initially the machine was used for general radiography, and as familiarity with its systems was acquired, the first angiograms were carried out in January 1982. The equipment has lived up to all of its design specifications, and after an initial period where there were some teething problems, it has functioned remarkably well and any minor breakdowns have been rapidly attended to by the C.G.R. servicemen.

The growth in demand for special procedures which include biopsies, nephrostomies, abscess and biliary drainage procedures, and arteriographic embolization techniques, has been as anticipated, but this has placed far greater demands on the nursing staff in the department, so that with two half-time sisters, we were still very short-handed at times when these procedures are being carried out. This has been overcome in part by the recent approval of a further half-time nursing sister to be included in the nursing establishment of the department.

Our mammography equipment has also been installed in this period and there has been a steady demand for this service. The ability to diagnose small non-clinically apparent cancers of the breast, brings with it a new set of problems which must be solved, namely the localisation of these lesions so that surgical removal is feasible. We have been involved in using several different localisation techniques, and now believe that we have a satisfactory system for localising all small suspicious breast lesions. These systems have already been employed in the successful removal of cancers which were not apparent at clinical examination. The quality of the pictures achieved with this equipment represents a really significant advance when compared with the techniques employed previously, bringing to the diagnoses a sense of certainty and accuracy impossible to achieve without this specialised apparatus.

Continued growth in the number of ultrasound examinations occurred during the 1981/82 period, and the workload has now well exceeded the level at which all the scans can be conducted completely by the two radiologists. All the radiographers are now undergoing on-the-job training in ultrasound techniques, rotating through the ultrasound service on a weekly basis, and receiving supervised instruction in the conduct of the scans. There is no doubt that having the equipment situated in the basement causes some delays and difficulties, but unfortunately at this stage, we do not have sufficient room in the department to shift this facility from the basement to the main

department. This will have to wait until a further expansion of the department occurs.

In the preceeding twelve months, Dr. Rogan has attended two meetings on interventional radiology, the 1st last August, being the Inaugral Meeting of the new subspeciality branch of the Royal Australian College of Radiologists, and at the 2nd Winter Meeting presented a paper on interventional radiology in a base hospital. I attended the Annual Meeting of the Australian Society for Ultrasound in Medicine in Queensland, in September 1981, and the Royal Australasian College of Radiologists Meeting in New Zealand in November 1981.

Mr. Alan Welch our darkroom attendant participated in a meeting organized by Kodak, Victoria, in Darkroom Techniques and Management. Miss Stewart attended a one day mammography demonstration in Melbourne during the early part of 1982.

Miss Jane Rounsevell resigned during the year to travel in England and on the Continent, and we recruited Mr. Luke Pontonio, 1st year Radiographer from Melbourne to replace this loss.

At no stage in the previous history of the department has there been a more significant or more far reaching change in its activities than has occurred in the previous twelve months. These changes have caused some stress, to the nursing establishment, in the reception area with the booking of patients, and on Radiographers and Radiologists time. The addition of a further nursing sister to the staff will be a considerable help in relieving some of these problems, and it is hoped that the others can be overcome by some reorganization of rosters and of booking procedures, which is being carried out as this report is prepared.

Geriatrician's Report

The main event that has taken place during this past year has been the closing of Alveston House and opening of the new 50 bed complex at 'Lyndoch'. It was the end of

an era in which 'Alveston' had served the Community and the Aged with compassion and loving care for the past 30 years. Coincidental with this was the retirement of Mrs. I. Bruce, the Director of Nursing at Alveston House, and a sincere tribute was paid to her and the Alveston staff by the staff of the hospital and the Board of Management at a presentation luncheon on 29.1.82.

Again this year there have been the inevitable changes in staff. It was with regret that I accepted the resignation of Dr. J. O'Callaghan as Assistant Specialist Geriatrician as from the 1st of February, 1982, who was unable to continue in this appointment when he was appointed full-time Medical Superintendent of the hospital. All the staff of the Department congratulate him on his appointment; he will, however, be continuing his interest and participation in the Cardiac Rehabilitation Programme. Miss S. Scott, Occupational Therapist, resigned on 18.9.81. During her 2 years with the department she developed, and was responsible for a very successful therapy group of Ward 9 patients. Miss K. McNamara, her successor, was appointed on 11.11.81. Miss M. Maguire, Physiotherapist, resigned on 29.1.82 to go on an overseas trip; she worked in both the department and in the region, and was a very energetic and hard working therapist.

The year has ended with a further major development. After years of contemplation that a second Day Hospital would eventually

be established at Terang, the Terang Day Hospital was opened in the Band Hall, Cobden St., Terang on the 16th June, 1982. Although the original plan to build a new Day Hospital in the town never materialised, the establishment of a Day Hospital in the Band Hall became possible with the generous help from the Apex Club in Terang to carry out the necessary alterations and construction. The Terang Day Hospital will operate 3 days a week (Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays), and will be partially staffed by the Terang Hospital with physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech therapy being made available as a part of the Warrnambool Base Hospital regional therapy services.

Pathologist's Report

To begin the 1981-82 Annual Report, the loss of Dr. J. Kempler back to Sydney is the most important change in this Department. His knowledge and direction promises to be a hard act to follow.

The past 12 months maintained a steady

increase of pathology services. The total number of specimens received was 2310 more than the previous year. This number is deceptive because the number of tests per specimen has increased over the year. The maintenance of an increase of productivity without compromising of quality and speed of service is undoubtedly partly due to the improved instrument efficiency. The most important of all is a team of excellent staff which any pathologist would be proud to be associated.

Staff turnover has been inevitable. We have lost the services of Mrs. Chris Smith, Miss Jan Henderson and Sister Heather Campbell. We have acquired the services of Miss Gail Pavia, Mr. Ray Carty and Sister Sally Miller. The trauma of change-over has been soothed mainly by the experience and capability of Mr. Geoff O'Brien and the enthusiastic approach of the new number of staff members. Their effort should be congratulated.

A new publication of this department entitled the "Warrnambool Bulletin of Clinical Laboratory Medicine" began in March. This is an effort of this department to reach out to medical practitioners hoping to improve communication and understanding between the producer of the pathology reports and the medical practitioners.

DIVISIONAL REPORTS

Blood Bank: 2226 donors are at present registered in Warrnambool. In the past year 1375 donations were received. Of these 866

came from the enthusiastic country centres of Timboon, Port Fairy, Terang, Camperdown and Mortlake. Our grateful thanks to all the organisers, medical officers and voluntary helpers who spare their valuable time.

St. Johns Ambulance Brigade performed unfailingly as ever, collecting the blood from the country donor sessions and returning it promptly to the bank. The voluntary helpers and past trainees are much appreciated. It was with regret that we farewelled Mr. Merv Ritchie retiring after over 20 years of devoted service to the donor sessions. He was always there in need and his cheery self will be much missed. We welcome Mrs. Lois Collins as his replacement and look forward to a happy association with her.

Sister Elsa Hill, in charge of donor sessions at Warrnambool, retired over two years ago and her recent sudden demise came as a shock to us all. Our sympathy is extended to all her family.

No new radical methods to report in the past year. A team effort all round, with grateful thanks to all concerned, especially the donors. Without them there would be no Blood Transfusion Service here.

Biochemistry: During the year the biochemistry laboratories processed 77,800 tests on 21,599 patients, which represents an increase of 12.1% on last year's figures.

The new Du Pont Automatic Chemistry Analyser which was introduced in December 1981 has been very successful for the analysis of emergency, stat and special tests. The predicted improvement in test turnover has been achieved and delays in reporting critical results are minimal. Several new tests have been made available, e.g. CKMB (cardiac enzyme), Phenobarbiturate, Alcohol, Lipase, Lactate, Ammonia, Pseudocholinesterase.

In the Radioimmuno assay section the new twelve channel gamma-counter has reduced procedure time and allowed the introduction of Serum Ferritin tests.

In 1983 the advance will hopefully be on Profile testing rather than batch testing.

It is intended to introduce a random access analyser which allows grouping of tests by patient sample request instead of by test type. This permits more efficient treatment of test groups such as liver function tests, lipid profiles etc. This system is also more compatible with computer data capture and reporting.

Haematology: Demand for Haematology continued to increase during the past year. 17,009 specimens were received in this section. The figure for the previous year (1980-81) was 14,834 specimens and this represents an increase of 2,175 or 13%.

This year saw the introduction of immunofluorescence tests. We are applying this technique to demonstrate anti nuclear antibodies (ANA) and anti toxoplasma antibodies. Because of limited staff members in this section it is unlikely that any further development using this technique will be possible. If workload continues to increase at the present rate without staff increases, further automation will be necessary in this section. Computer applications to improve workflow and reporting is being investigated.

Cytology: Exploration cytology service started in 1968-69. This has steadily increased and in the last 12 months aspiration biopsy demand increased by 80%. As a result, Mr. David McKenzie attended the Karolinska Institute in Stockholm, for eight weeks to acquire diagnostic techniques from one of the world's leading instructors in aspiration cytology, with a view of improving service in this area.

Microbiology: A monthly data collection of infection in the hospital enables us to produce a table summarizing the number and type of infection in the various wards. This enables the Infection Control Committee to have a clear idea of the trend of infection in this hospital and identify a common source so that measures can be implemented to avoid spread.

The State of Victoria is having a threat of a resistant organism known as Methicillin Resistant Staphylococcus. I am happy to report that this has not been a problem in this district and infection has not been a problem in this hospital.

Histology and Morbid Anatomy and Cytochemistry: This division has always been the most labour intensive part of pathology here as well as anywhere else. With the increase in multiple endoscopic biopsies and needle biopsies, the amount of work involved has increased many times more than the number of specimens because 10 or 12 small biopsy specimens from the same patient only counts as one specimen in this department. Mr. Frank Noonan who copes with this workload normally requires two or more people in other establishments and he deserves more than just congratulations.

Post mortem requests have increased by 9% over the past 12 months. However, the overall percentage of post mortems should still be improved, particularly those patients whose post mortem findings could enlighten us in clinical manifestation of the disease. This remains one of the most important factors in medical progress.

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




